MEMBERS FOR WHEAT POOL

Aim of Organization is to Add 10,000 This Year Following Successful Operation

CALGARY, Oct. 7.—Aiming at an increase in its membership of 10,000 the Alberta Wheat Pool has inaugurated a campaign to be conducted on an entirely different basis to those previously organized on the prairies.

The objective of the organization committee is to boost the membership to 42,000, which in the average of acreage, will bring the total acreage of the pool to 4,200,000, an increase of nearly a million acres.

The success of the past two years prompted the directors of the pool to authorize the present canvass, which will be pursued to the end of the year. In the past all canvassing has been done voluntarily, but President H. W. Wood, and the board of directors to recompense canvassers on a commission basis. Delegates and local secretaries are eligible to participate in the drive.

In 1923, the first year of its operation, the Alberta Wheat Pool handled 34,222,833 bushels of wheat, that had a total value of \$37,516,528. The crop of 1924 was not so uniformly good, 23,025,135 bushels of wheat passing through the Pool, valued at \$35,050,000.

The deductions made from the 1923 pool for reserve funds were \$211,580, and from the 1924 pool, approximately \$590,000. The cost of operation per bushel was in 1923, 2-5 of one cent, and

in 1924, about 3-8 of one cent. In sending out payments for last year's crop, 85,000 cheques were issued.

The combined membership of the three Canadian wheat pools is 110,000 and the volume of wheat handled during the past season was in excess of 80,000,000 bushels. It is estimated that the Central Selling Agency will handle this year nearly 140,000,000 bushels of prairie wheat.

MEIGHEN'S POLICY TOWARD RAILROADS

Exception Taken to it by Conservative Paper of Edmonton

(Edmonton Journal)

The answer which Mr. Meighen gave to the president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, when requested to state definitely his policy toward the government railway system, goes far towards clearing up a point on which his attitude as expressed in his Wingham speech gave concern to those who on other grounds are inclined to support him. Any economies in connection with the C.N.R., he told the brotherhood president, which he proposed would be consistent with the efficient operation of all capital expenditure, which he was reported as favoring would not be consistent with efficient operation and it is inconceivable, in view of the part which he took in launching the enterprise on a government owned basis, that, if returned once more to power, he would put such a policy into effect.

STORK TELLS ABOUT VISIT

Says he is Receiving Splendid Support in Mining Camps of Portland Canal

"In every place I spoke, that is at Anxox Beach, Anxox Mine, Alice Arm, Premier and Stewart, I am getting splendid support," declared Fred Stork, who arrived home yesterday after a visit to those points, accompanied by George Casey. The meetings, he says, were exceptionally fine and the people seemed to appreciate the policies of Premier Mackenzie King; especially in regard to the reduction of the duties on mining equipment. This interest will be reflected in the vote on election day, Mr. Stork says.

Going first to Alice Arm, Mr. Stork held a very fine meeting which was well attended by a sympathetic audience. Friday, he spoke in the theatre at Anxox Beach. The building was well filled and he was given a most attentive hearing, Saturday night at Anxox Mine was one of the best meetings of the trip. It was very enthusiastic and not a word of criticism was heard.

Passing on to Premier, a splendid meeting was held in the reading room which was attended by a large number of miners and others. At the joint meeting at Stewart there was a certain amount of heckling, such as is not unusual at a meeting of that kind.

Mr. Stork says he was given splendid support everywhere and is assured of good majorities at those points.

IS HARD FOR CONSERVATIVES

Manion Declares Building of Prince Rupert Elevator is Unjustifiable

(Prince George Citizen)

Dr. R. J. Manion, of Fort William, one of Meighen's first lieutenants, is making the going very difficult for Conservatives in the northern portion of British Columbia. Speaking in the interests of one of the Conservative candidates in Toronto last week he attacked the government of Mackenzie King upon the score of extravagance, and as one of the needful and unjustifiable expenditures he cited the wheat elevator now under construction at Prince Rupert.

Every old-time resident of northern British Columbia knows the building of the wheat elevator marks the end of a long period of starvation to which liberal and Conservative administrations at Ottawa subjected this section of the province. The fight to secure recognition for that portion of British Columbia which is served by 700 miles of the Canadian National Railway system has been long and at many times most discouraging. Within the past year sufficient pressure was brought upon the government of Mackenzie King to induce him to consent to modest expenditure in the way of a wheat elevator at Prince Rupert with a view of providing tonnage for 700 miles of comparatively idle government rails.

Work in Progress

This work is still in progress, but before the wisdom of the expenditure can be put to the test Mr. Meighen's lieutenant in Ontario denounces the expenditure to the electors of Toronto as a reprehensible extravagance. Is this to be taken as an indication that Mr. Meighen has lost hope of securing support for his policies in northern British Columbia? Can he expect the electors of the Skeena, or those of the northern portion of the Cariboo riding to mark their ballots for George Bushby or for John A. Fraser, when his lieutenant condemns as an extravagance expenditures which at the best represent belated justice to the northern portion of British Columbia, in which many millions of dollars were spent years ago in the building of a transcontinental railway?

It is not suggested the government of Mackenzie King has been guileless in the matter of extravagances, but if those in connection with the building of the wheat elevator at Prince Rupert must be given a high light to bring the accusation home its record must be much better than even some of its critics have been inclined to believe.

MANY ARE KILLED BY AUTOS IN TOKIO

TOKIO, Oct. 7.—The number of traffic accidents in the busy streets of Tokio are rapidly increasing, according to the metropolitan police records. During the past 12 months, ended in March, there were 6,123 motor car accidents in which 81 persons were killed and 3,196 injured. There were almost as many bicycle and wagon accidents. In tram car accidents 76 were killed and 1,925 injured.
