In 1922 he was with the Charleston, S.C., and in 1923 with Nashville, where Pittsburgh obtained him again and played him in eleven games. A man weighing nearly 180 pounds, he has exceptional speed on the bases and his throwing arm is mighty. On the defense he is known as a "ball hawk." Cuyler was born in Harrisville, Mich., Aug. 30, 1899. During the winter he coaches industrial athletic teams in Flint, Mich.
