Trio of Celebrated Artists - Open First Concert Of Alaska Music Trail Series Here Sept. 24th

Three celebrated artists will be heard on the opening program of the 1952-53 Alaska Music Trail concert series at the Civic Centre on Sept. 24. A trio with Bela Urban, Luigi Silva and Maxim Schapiro playing the violin,

cello and piano offers almost unlimited musical enjoyment. Usually, the violinist takes the lead and plays the star part in an ensemble but with this group especially formed for introduc-

ing this famous kind of music to northern audiences, each instrument will share equally in presenting the beautiful and well known music.

Especially popular is violin and cello playing with a colorful background of the piano to re-echo the singing melodies and exciting crescendos of the strings.

Luigi Silva and Maxim Schapiro are coming as old friends because of former tours in the North. Both artists have made great strides in their careers as world famous musicians since they were last here. Bela Urban, a Hungarian by birth, has risen steadily since being decorated by the French Government for his services in the cause of French Music When in the Army Air Force during World War II, he toured South America spreading good-will with the AAF orchestra and was soloist under Andra Kostelanetz with the orchestra.

He owns and will play here, the famous Hawley Guadagnini violin dating back to 1780.

Alaska Bound Hitch-Hikers Seek Globe-Trotting Tour

CALGARY (CP) — Two venturesome young women—Sylvia Taylor of London, England and Corrine Young of Hawkes Bay, New Zealand—struck out from Calgary recently to hitch-hike to Alaska and the Arctic Circle.

The two, from opposite sides of the globe, have travelled thousands of miles in search of adventure. Equipped only with rucksacks, they left Calgary on the last leg of a journey that resulted from a chance meeting in Vancouver.

The girls, in their early 20's will reach their goal when they skirt the perimeter of the Arctic Circle.

By the time they get back to their homes, however, both girls will have been round the world. For Sylvia Taylor this was not her first hitch-hiking experience. She has visited almost every country in western Europe in this fashion and once passed through the Iron Curtain into Red Russia. It is Corrine Young's first trip outside of New Zealand.

PLANS CHANGED
Sylvia had planned to cruise the Caribbean Sea, but her boat was found unseaworthy. As a result, she visited Eastern Canada and the United States and then came west to Vancouver.

Corrine, on the other hand, just wanted to see the world. So she sold her only race horse and booked passage for Canada with the intention of going on to England and Africa before returning home.

On the Alaska hike, the girls planned to go up through Alberta and return along the coast of British Columbia to Vancouver.

Canada's west impressed both girls during their trip from Vancouver to Calgary. They said they want to come back and settle, probably in Vancouver, a city they say is the most beautiful they've seen.

In the meantime, before they make a choice, Sylvia from London wants to spend a Christmas in Australia while Corrine from New Zealand wants to spend a Christmas in Canada.

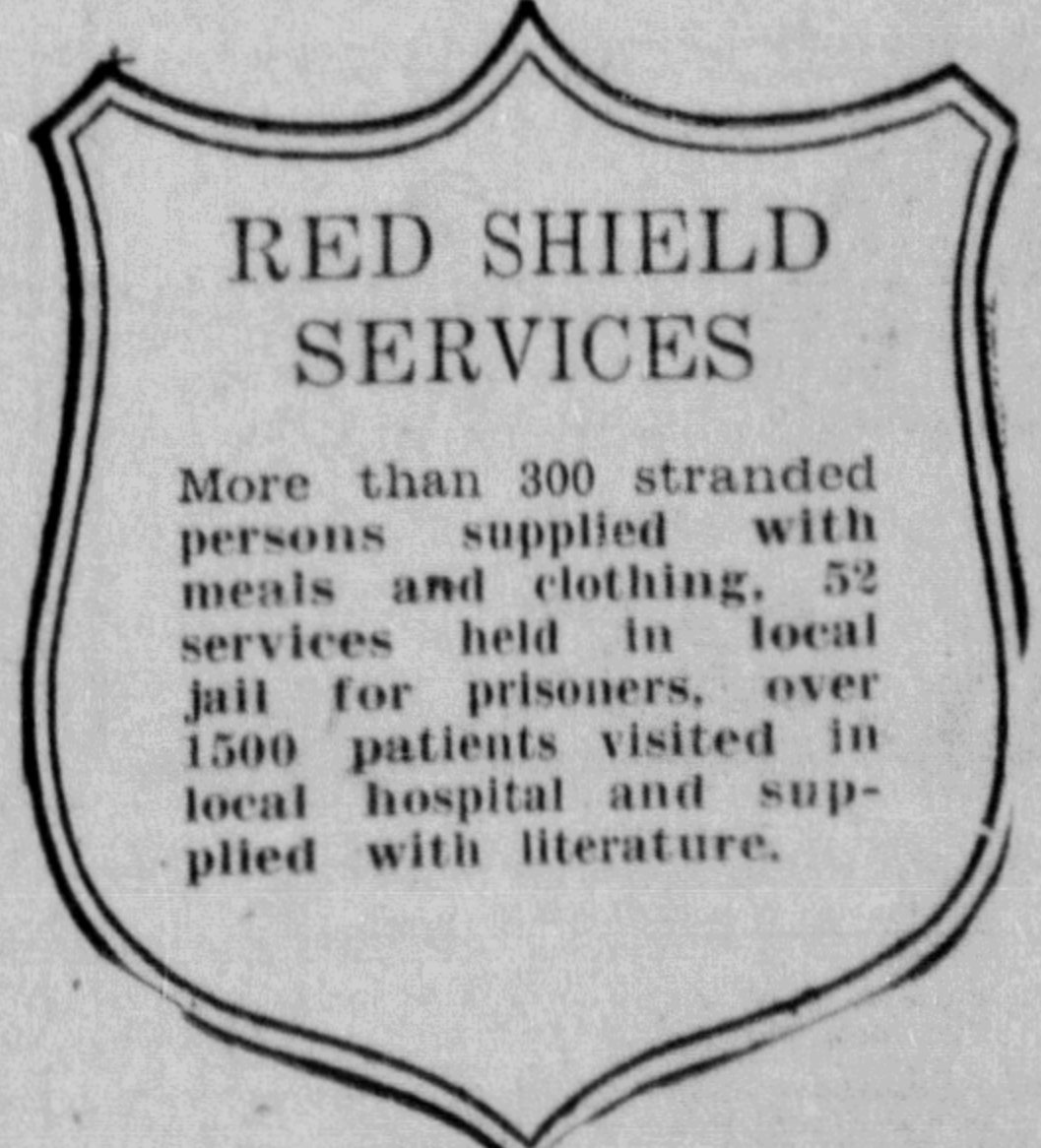
