### 4 Union Men Denied Entry Into United States

SEATTLE (CP) — Announcement that four Canadian union delegates have been denied entry to the United States was made here Wednesday by immigration officials.

John Boyd, district immigration director, said they refused entry on the grounds their presence would not be in "the best interests of the United States."

The four were identified as British Columbia officials of the International Woodworkers of America who were headed for the union's convention in Portland.

The director identified the WA men as Edgar C. E. Wood, Benjamin R. Carlyle, Albert L. Smith and Magnus S. Matson.

## Many Aspirants Seek Spot On Canadian Television

TORONTO — When Jimmy Durante thrusts his big schnozzle forward and rasps "everybody wants to get into da act" audiences love it.

But when dark-haired, attractive Eva Langford says it, she moans a little. She is casting director for CBC television in Toronto.

Toronto-born Miss Langford has been a leading lady in several Broadway productions, active in New York radio and, coincidentally, went through the early days of United States television—as an actress.

"So far I've seen, talk to or corresponded with about 1,000 actors and singers before station CBLT went on the air Sept. 8," she said in an interview.

"We managed to squeeze in about 300 auditions on camera, between experimental shows by producers and technical personnel and while contractors still were putting the finishing touches on the building here on Jarvis Street.

"Fortunately there is a large professional group with considerable experience in radio or commercial theatre here. Some are from Toronto but many have come from all parts of Canada, attracted by radio, theatre or the coming of television.

"Because television demands the highest professional standards, a television studio during a broadcast is a hectic place.

"The pace is terrific. There are only a comparatively few hours to rehearse. The studio is cluttered with cameras, lights and their long cables. There are many technical people around and unless an artist is in complete command of his medium he is lost."

Miss Langford went to New

York while young and was a scholarship pupil at the famed Neighborhood Playhouse. She was "discovered" by Orson Welles and played with him in "Panic," on Broadway. This led to her favorite role, Miriamne in "Winterset," with Burgess Meredith which won the first Critics' Award. Her own acting also won a players' award.

Then followed much radio work. With television emerging in the mid-1940's she was in demand and acted with some of the biggest names in theatre.

"Almost every big television show in those days was a 'first' of some kind," she said.

"I was in 'Winterset' which was the first full-length play, televised as a stage play. It ran 2 1/2 hours. The NBC estimated the audience at 20,000. Big then, in September, 1945, but now audiences run into millions.

She returned to Toronto early in 1951 to scout the possibility of establishing theatre-in-the-round. She may favor Moore, chief producer for CBLT and joined the CBC about a year ago.

Starting from scratch she built up the elaborate—and first—organization for casting. Here, actors and singers are cross-indexed as to type, experience, specialties and availability.

Her ambition? "I want to be a producer. I hope I shall get a chance soon."

## Can. Legion Enters Fight Against Polio

MONTREAL — The Canadian Legion polio fund entered the fight against the current polio epidemic at Winnipeg Monday night as they sent two large iron lungs from here to the Winnipeg Municipal Hospital via the Canadian National Express.

The two machines, both Emerson respirators, were shipped after an urgent call by medical authorities in the Manitoba capital was received by A. C. Solomon, chairman of the Canadian Legion Polio Fund. Mr. Solomon reported that the machines were purchased by the Legion less than a month ago and were donated to the Alexandra Hospital of Montreal and the Sherbrooke General Hospital for use against polio.

He pointed out, however, that the Legion reserved the right to borrow the machines from these two centres if needed elsewhere.

"Since the Legion has this right and since there is no polio to speak of in the Montreal area, we are shipping them to Winnipeg where they are badly needed," he said.

He added that they would be returned to Montreal once the epidemic was halted, and would be reshipped to the two hospitals which originally received them as a donation from the Canadian Legion Polio Fund.

## SCREEN ★ FLASHES

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Joseph Dunninger, famed mind reader and magician here to help mastermind the film of "Houdini," says his profession has its drawbacks.

"For instance," he said, "a few years ago I was to be interviewed by a magazine writer. When she arrived, she didn't ask any questions. She wanted me to guess what she was asking."

Dunninger's reputation naturally precludes any card games. When he was appearing at a Las Vegas casino, the management requested that he stay away from the black jack table.

"And my friends won't play cards with me," he added.

He is bothered by innumerable practical jokers and gagsters. And then there are just plain pests.

Dunninger said he is often bothered at parties by having the host ask him to perform. His reply is now standard: He tells them that he has a contract form handy and he'll sign it up on his act—at the usual rates.

The magic business, Dunninger said, is in bad shape. Every other person is an amateur magician, he said. But there are few good professionals. Gone are the Thurston and Houdinis. "Of the big-time shows, only Blackstone remains," he remarked, "and he still puts on a good act."

"The trouble is that there are only two big vaudeville houses left—one in Canada and one in New York, the Palace. I think there is a big future for magic in television. But today's youngsters have only a few tricks. Those are expended in one week in TV."

Does he know the answer to the flying saucers?

"I only believe in things I can see," he replied. "I have never seen a flying saucer."

## Former Film Board Head Makes Mine-Disaster Film

LONDON (CP) — "The Brave Don't Cry," a film based on a Scottish coal-mining disaster, opened here to enthusiastic reviews.

This is one of the first pictures produced by the experimental Group 3, headed by documentary pioneer John Grierson. The purpose of the group, which has government backing, is to spend £250,000 a year on low-budget films with the object of training new stars and directors.

Critics agreed that "The Brave Don't Cry" is one of the best British pictures in a long time. The Manchester Guardian said it has a "mawkish title," but of all the films about Scotland so far made it is the one that rings truest. In London, the Evening News called it a "first class" picture.
