DINOSAURS OF THE RED DEER

River Valley in Alberta Adding Much to Knowledge of Early History of World

CAMROSE, Alta., Sept. 24.—Professor Sternberg, a palaeontologist working in the interests of the Victoria Museum, Ottawa, who has been directing the work of obtaining fossils in the Valley of the Red Deer river, was the speaker at the regular luncheon on Monday of the Camrose Rotary club held in the Arlington hotel. His address was exceptionally interesting and instructive and was illustrated by many fine lantern slides showing the characteristics of the country in which the fossils are found, close up views of the strata in which the bones are found, clear photographs of the re-assembled dinosaur skeletons and pictures of the huge prehistoric animals as they probably appeared in actual life. The work of Mr. Sternberg is more particularly connected with the search for the fossilized remains of dinosaurs for which the valley of the Red Deer has become famous.

Comparatively few people are aware of the extent and the scientific importance of the vast animal graveyard which nature has preserved in parts of the valley of the Red Deer river in Alberta. The speaker stated that this valley embraces the richest known deposits in the whole world of the remains of the dinosaurs. Some two hundred species of these animals are known to have existed in the primeval ages as proved by discoveries in various parts of the world. The Alberta field has made a very considerable contribution to the knowledge already obtained regarding these gigantic animals. As showing the scientific value of the Red Deer valley deposits it was stated that prior to 1912, when the work of discovery was commenced in the area, there was only one species of the Duckbill Dinosaur known. Now eleven species, at least, are known to have existed.

Age of Reptiles

The speaker explained that the dinosaurs were the dominant type of animal life in the "Age of Reptiles" which has been calculated to have lasted for nine millions of years and which period of the world's history is conservatively estimated to have closed three million years ago. At that time a great inland sea extended east of the Rocky Mountains from the Arctic Ocean to the Gulf of Mexico. In this region grew enormous quantities of aquatic or swamp plants providing abundant food for the many species of dinosaurs then existing. Other species were flesh eaters, preying upon the animal life of the region and possibly also upon their vegetable dinosaur cousins. The reason for the disappearance of these strange animals is veiled in mystery and can only be left to conjecture. Probably their elimination was due either to the extreme old age of the orders or perhaps to the changing climatic conditions and the consequent change in the nature of the food supply.

The popular conception of the size of the dinosaurs seems to be that they were gigantic animals but this is not true of all the species as their sizes varied from that of the common house cat to creatures of one hundred feet or more in height and of corresponding bulk. Some were built heavily and slow of movement while others were swift in action. Some had aquatic habits while others seldom or ever en-

tered the water. All the species had four legs and some were web-footed. Some had long necks and small heads while others had short necks and large heads. In some species the skin was thin and smooth; in others the body covering was almost impenetrable and further protected by flint-hard bony projections.

Difficult Work

The work of obtaining fossil specimens of dinosaur skeletons is at best difficult and in many instances hazardous. To discover these remains requires perseverance. Each square foot of the exposed fossil-bearing strata must be carefully examined and when a specimen is found great care must be taken to safeguard against breakage or other injury. Canada, and especially Alberta, is contributing in a large measure to the present-day knowledge of prehistoric animal life upon the earth and especially with regard to those creatures designated as dinosaurs. What the future may reveal through additional discoveries in other fields in the province of Alberta can only be determined as time passes.

U.S. LABOR IS NON-PARTISAN

Will Support Candidate on Either Side that are Favorable to Their Cause

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(By Canadian Press).—Increased political influence wielded by organized labor is seen here as the result of the recent announcement of the American Federation of Labor that it will conduct a strenuous non-partisan political campaign in the 1926 congressional elections. It will steer clear of the third party movement or, in fact, of any political party, according to the decision reached by its executive council. The policy will be the one which it followed for many years prior to 1924. Then it deviated from its usual course by supporting the third ticket headed by La Follette. Now, it will go back to the proposition of fighting all candidates looked on as unfriendly to organized labor and supporting all who are regarded as friendly to organized labor.

Shrewd political observers believe this is the strongest and most effective policy the A.F. of L. can adopt. Certain it is that as a result of following it for years, the strength of the Labor group in Congress steadily increased. In the 1926 campaign, as a result of the program mapped out by labor, there is not much doubt it will elect to Congress a formidable "labor bloc." This group may be strong enough to hold the balance of power in one or both houses.

It is now evident that the third party movement of last year failed of its objective and is viewed by organized labor as a mistake in strategy. While there is still talk of pressing for the building up of the third party, the action of the A.F. of L. probably means the movement will gradually die out. This does not mean that there is not a powerful revolt in sentiment among the voters against the old parties. It means that vast numbers of voters feel they can be most effective by taking an independent course.

CLASSES HERE IN NAVIGATION

Here to look into the possibility of establishing navigation classes for halibut fishermen during the close season this winter, Capt. Lionel H. Lindsay of Vancouver, examiner of masters and mates, is a visitor in the city. The Halibut Fishermen's Union particularly is pressing the advisability of instituting such classes and it is said that there might be at least one hundred men who would avail themselves of the opportunity of taking up the studies if arrangements can be made to hold the classes. Capt. Lindsay himself is thoroughly in approval of the idea and feels that it would be well for the fishermen to obtain qualifications officially especially since they have to go so much further afield now in pursuit of their occupation and also because Prince Rupert as a port gives promise of being much busier in the near future. Capt. Marsh, resident of this city and capable instructor in matters pertaining to navigation, is willing to take charge of the classes. The matter of accommodation is something that will have to be worked out and Capt. Lindsay, during his visit here, is going into the question.
