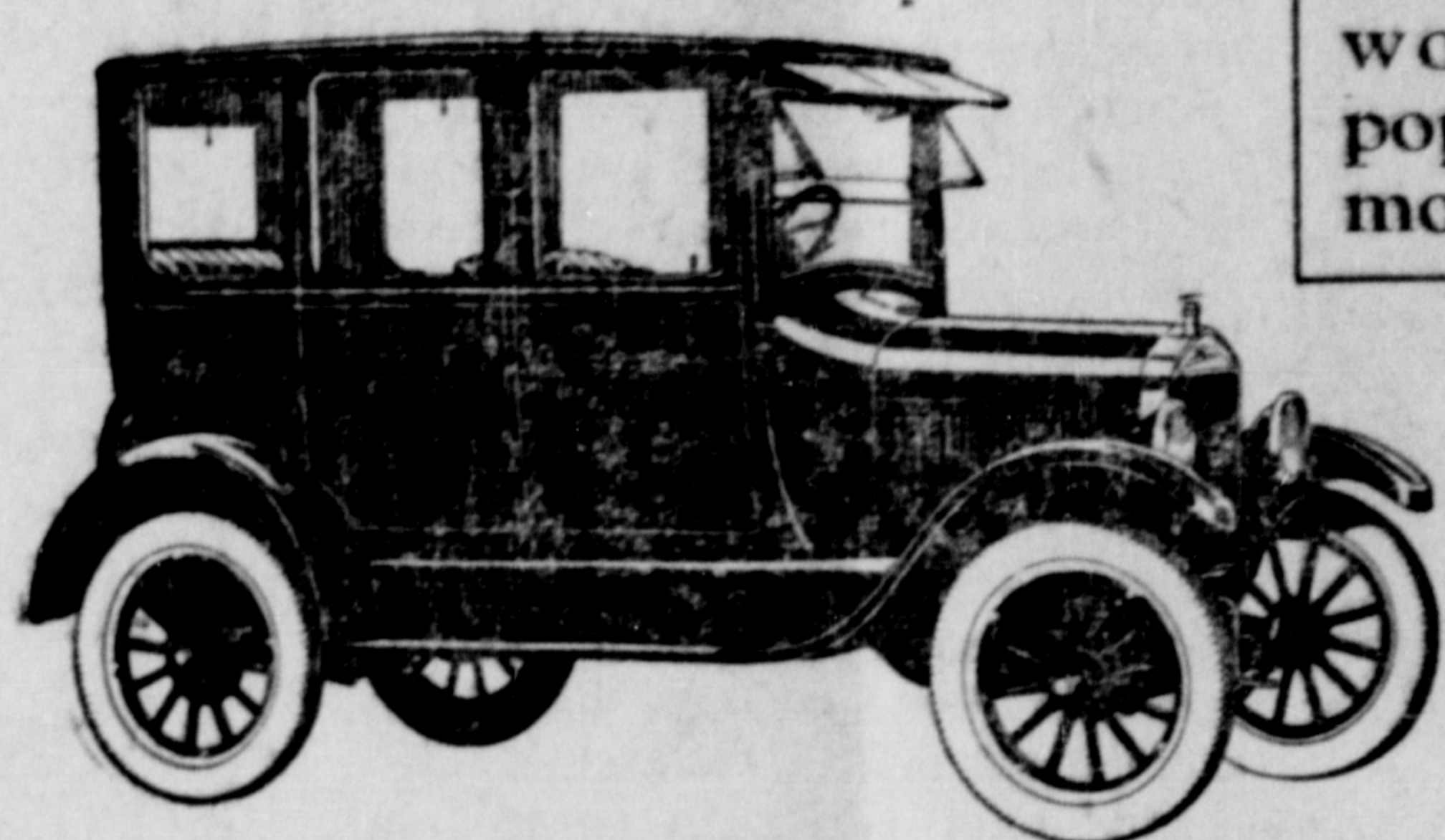

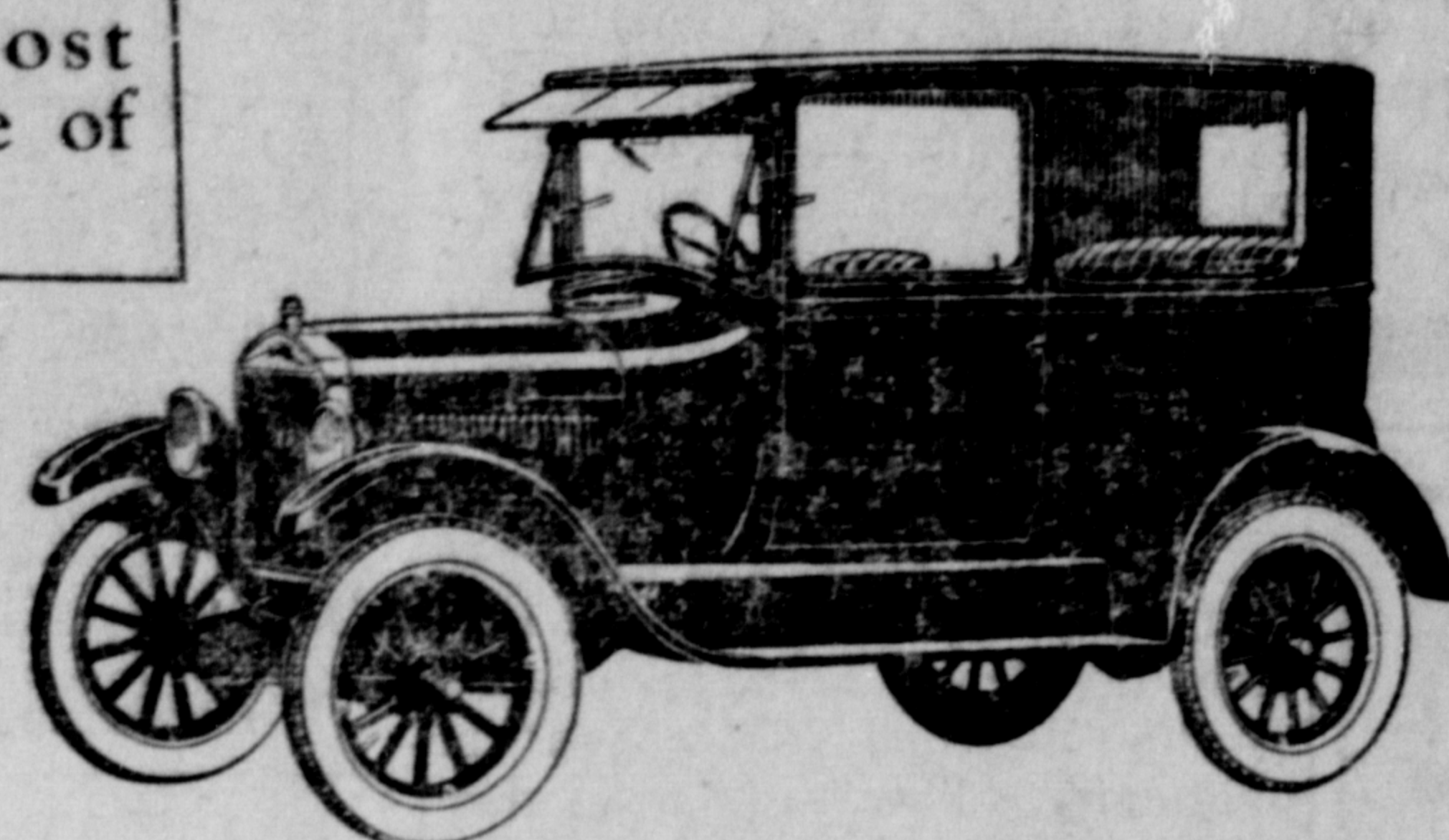
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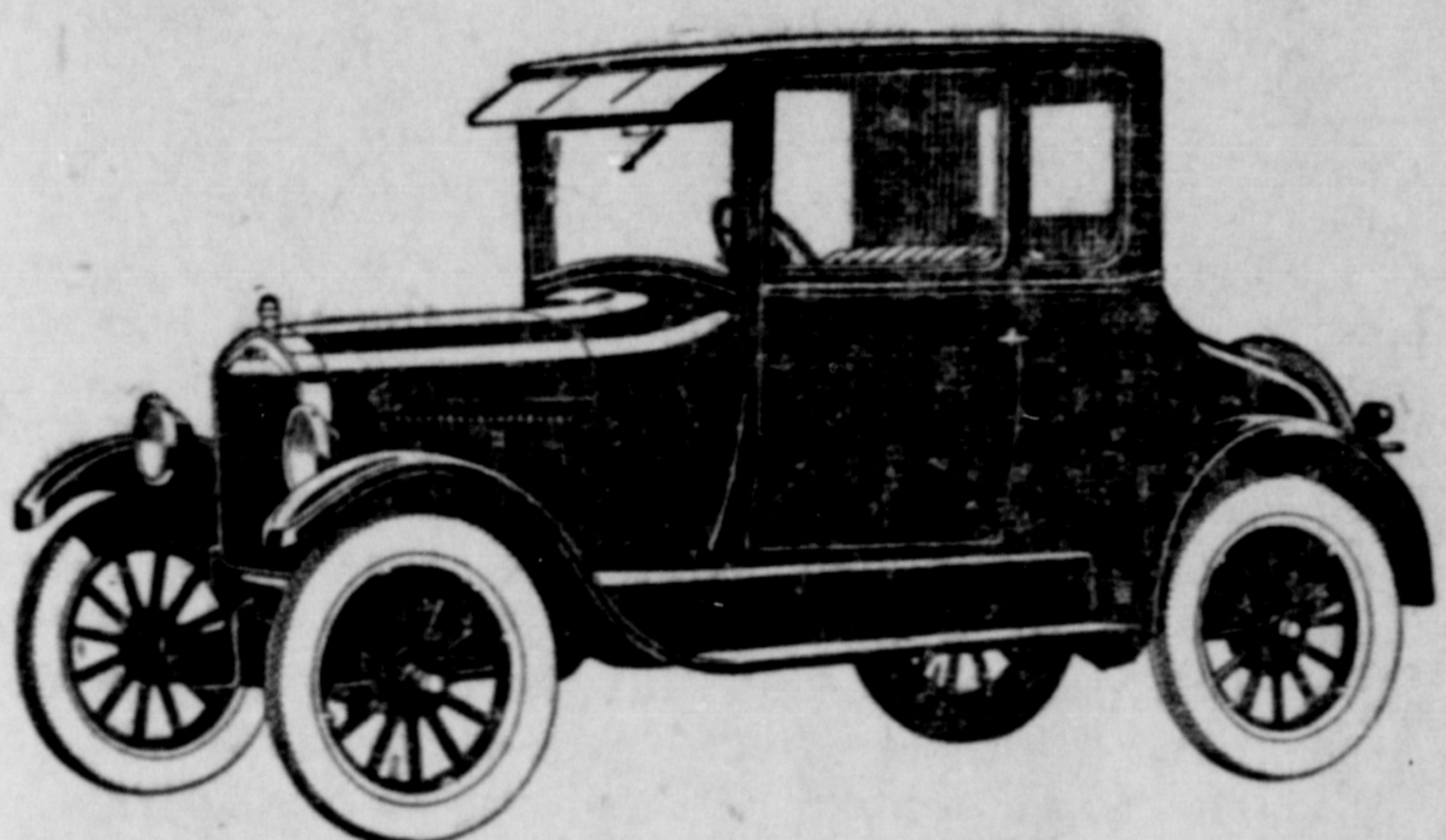
The Fordor Sedan

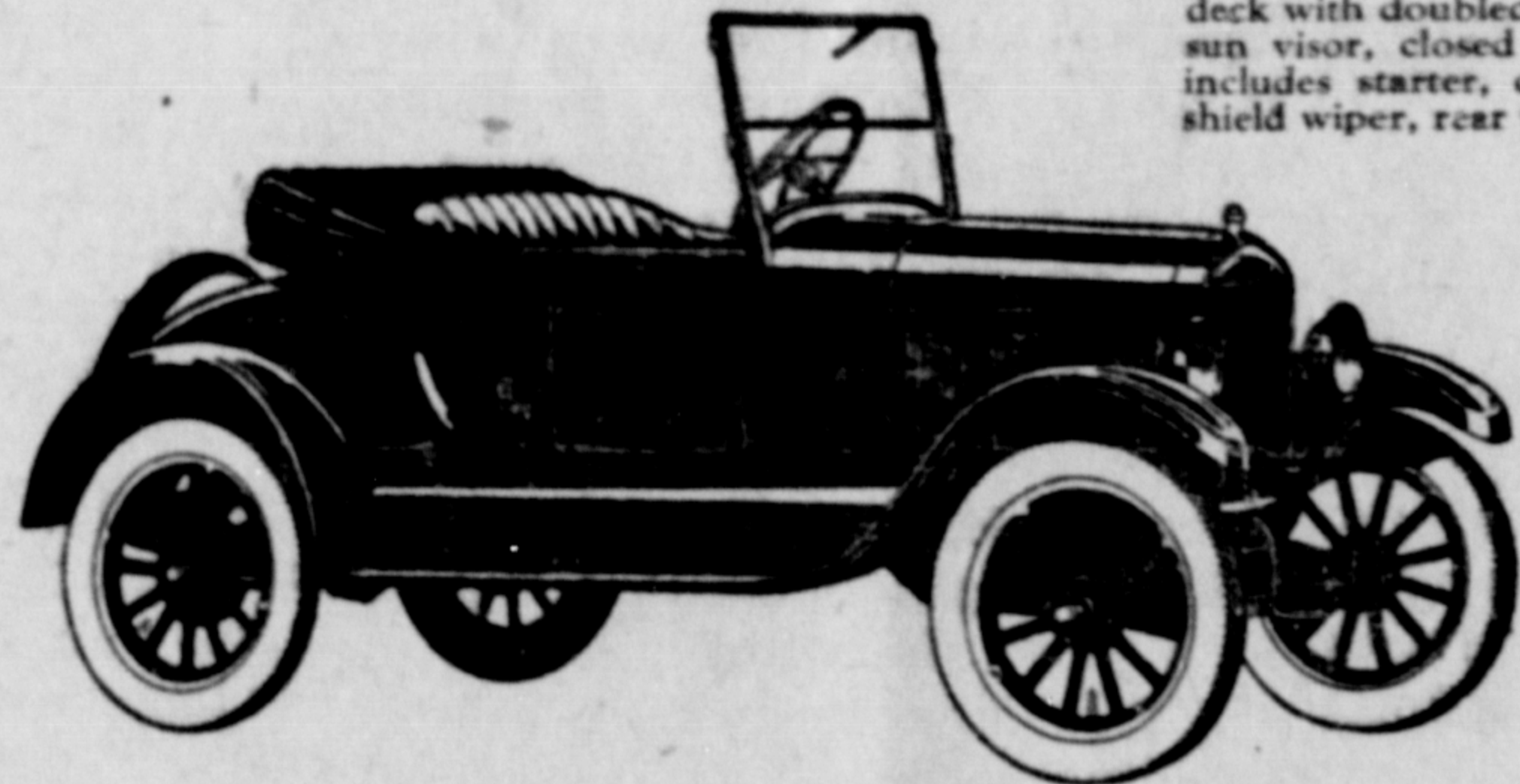
The Tudor Sedan

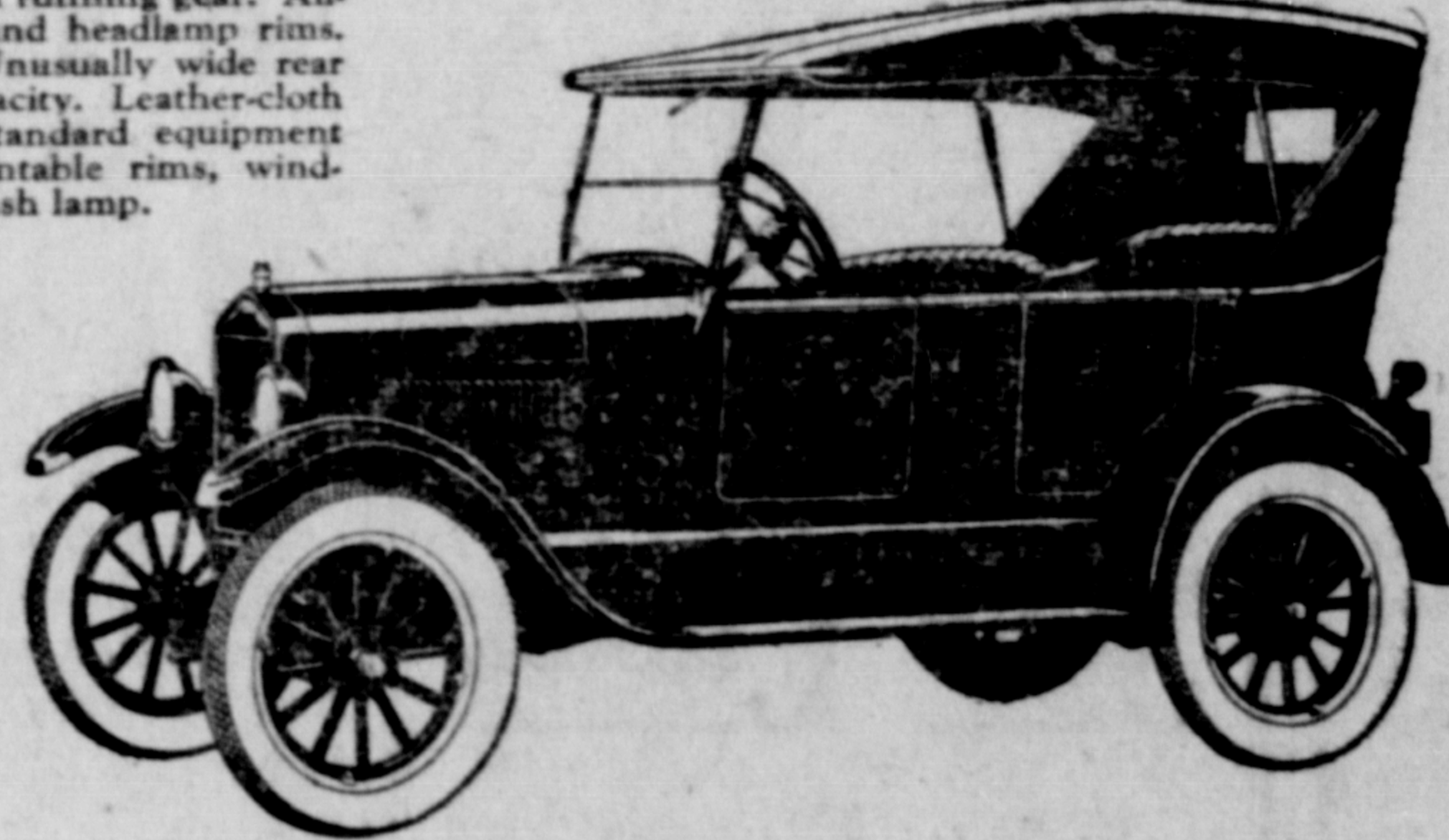
The Coupe

CONDITIONS PLEASE BANKS.

DUBLIN, Sept. 15. — Irish banks generally praise what they characterize as "the admiral re-cord of legislative achievement" in the Free State and "appreciate the more secure conditions un-der which business is being con-ducted." They are concerned, however, about the adverse na-tional trade balance, which in 1924, is given as \$85,000,000.

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
