Stubbington, owner of the automobile which caused fatal injuries to five-year-old Milton MacLean of this city, was guilty of negligence "in inviting and allowing his daughter (who is in her 15th year) to drive the vehicle," was the verdict of the jury at the inquest. The jury added a rider, "we recommend that the law regarding juveniles driving motor vehicles in the city be enforced and means taken to avoid such accidents."

Stubbington was held in custody on a charge of manslaughter. Witnesses gave evidence of having seen the girl driving the automobile at the time of the accident, and the girl made a deposition to the same effect, stating however that her father was seated by her side giving close attention.

KETCHIKAN SAWMILL HAVING GOOD SEASON

Shipping Half Million Feet Monthly to England and United States

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 13.—Between four and five hundred thousand feet of lumber is being shipped monthly from the Ketchikan Spruce Mills to Seattle according to E. J. Daly, operator and manager of the mill. Of these shipments part are sent to various sections of the States and part is transhipped to England. There have been more orders from England than from the Orient this year.

A larger per cent in an increase of foreign orders and orders from the States the past few years and a per cent which continues to increase, is developing into an established business. Mr. Daly says.

The Ketchikan mill will be operated until well into October this season.
