After having spent a couple of days at Stewart, J. F. Duthie of Seattle, well known district mining operator, and J. R. This morning they left for Smithers where Mr. Duthie will make his first inspection of the Duthie mines, following the recent reopening of the property.

Mr. Duthie's present trip is in the nature of a holiday and he will remain at Smithers for several days. Mrs. Duthie and Miss Helen Duthie are already there.

The mine at Smithers is now employing about thirty men and shipments are being made to the Consolidated Smelter at Trail at the rate of a car load a week. Auto trucks are used to bring the ore down Hudson Bay Mountain to the railway at Smithers. Mr. Duthie has relinquished the property at Doreen Creek, which he was developing last year. The original owner, J. Tredway, is again working it.

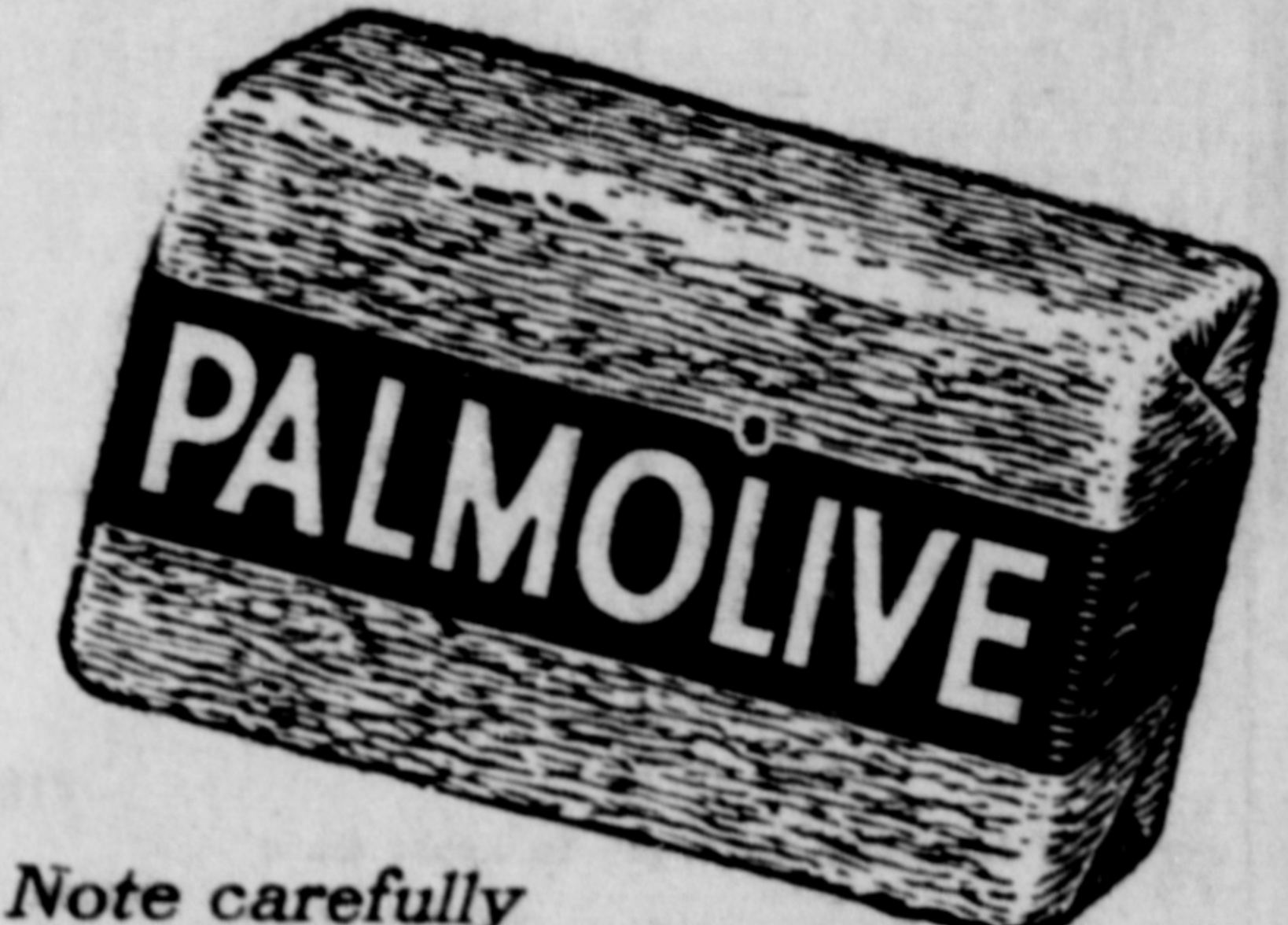
