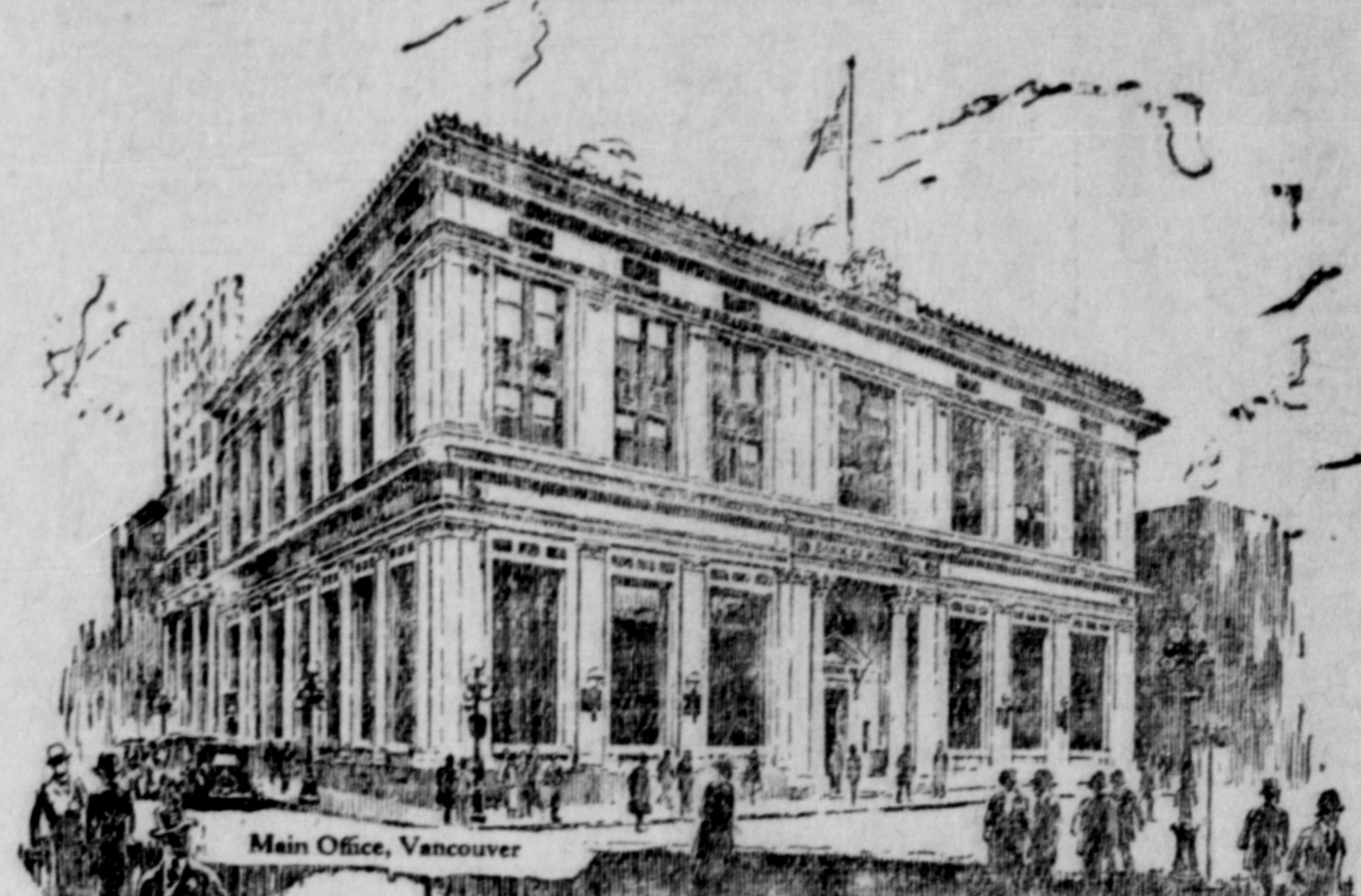

MUCH CONSTRUCTION WORK IN PROGRESS CANADIAN NATIONAL

WINNIPEG, Nov. 16.—During the past season 250 miles of new steel has been laid and more than 100 miles addition is expected to be laid before work ceases for the winter and approximately 375 miles of grade contracted for in 1924 was completed this year, it was announced today by officials of the company.

Steel laying was completed on the Kamloops-Kelowna line in B.C.; the Lumbay branch in B.C.; the Loverna west branch in Alberta and Pine Falls line, Manitoba, the Vancouver Island line and the meeting of the Lake Saskatchewan lines.

Work is continuing on the Gowichan Bay bridge, the Dunlop line in S.E. Saskatchewan; Eston in S.E. Saskatchewan; Hanna-Warden line, Alberta; and Pine Falls, Man.

Approximately 30 miles of new trackage has been laid for extension to existing yard tracks, sidings and spurs to provide for increasing traffic and approximately 135 miles of 85 pound steel has been laid to provide for heavier traffic and to release lighter rails for branch line construction.

Completion of the Loverna line will give railway service for the movement of grain this fall and the Kamloops-Kelowna branch has already provided facilities for marketing Okanagan fruit.
