GOOD FISHING ON NAAS RIVER

Coho and Chum Run Now Satisfactory—Three Canneries Still Operating

The run of cohoes and chums on the Naas River is much improved and fishing for these varieties this week was quite satisfactory, reports Adam Mackie, inspector of fisheries, who made an airplane trip to the Naas River district yesterday. A few sockeye have been caught in coho nets, but the run of sockeye is practically over and pink fishing is done for the season.

Mr. Mackie reports that three canneries—Arrandale, Naas Harbor and Wales Island—are still open in the Naas district and will continue operations for some time yet. The Wales Island traps will be taken up this week.

Speaking generally of the pack on the Naas River this year, Mr. Mackie says that the total sockeye pack is close to 18,000 cases which is double of the 9,000 cases in the cycle year of 1921. The entire pack of all varieties will be much lower this year than it was last.

ESTIMATED VALUE OF CANADIAN NATIONAL

Financial Post Mentions \$600,000,000 as Reasonable Amount Just Now

TORONTO, Sept. 4.—How much are Canada's national railways worth? Inquires the Financial Post. One prominent business leader has stated that they are not worth a dollar, even if Canada were to assume the entire present liability in connection with them. Another equally prominent business leader, who is in a position to make a careful estimate, states that Canada could find a market for the lines at about a third of its present investment. This could be roughly figured at about \$600,000,000. The figure seems reasonable, for with improved conditions and the curbing of services that are duplicated in one way or another and with savings in other directions, the national lines ought to be able to earn some return on investment of a few hundred millions.

Sir Joseph Flavelle first suggested a recapitalization of the Canadian National lines on the basis of earning power. Sir Henry Thornton has made similar suggestions. The Senate committee on railways considered it a necessary preliminary to a railway merger. One thing is certain; Canada does not know what its railways are worth.

ALASKA SALMON PACK IS LARGE AS EVER

SEATTLE, Sept. 4.—Commissioner of Fisheries Henry O'Malley, who arrived here Tuesday after a two months' tour in Alaska, said the salmon pack in the southeastern section of the Territory nearly equals that of last year, which totalled 2,700,000 cases.

O'Malley found the salmon beds well seeded in the southeastern section, which he said "speaks well for the future of the industry in that district."

He reported the pack was short at Port Moller and a financial failure at Squaw Harbor, Ikatun, King Grove and False Pass. He pronounced the pack in Prince William sound "very good considering the short year."

O'Malley defended the 64-hour closing period at Port Moller and said a complete closure of that area is under consideration to permit rehabilitation of the salmon fisheries.

O'Malley said the pack to the westward is 30 to 35 per cent short of last year's and added: "We applied regulations in the Bristol Bay district to conserve the fish. Any such movement is bound to injure some people but I desire to distribute the burden justly."
