IRISH BOUNDARY DIFFICULTY IS SETTLED

LIQUOR RING DISCOVERED IN WHICH CANADIAN IMPLICATED; 20 ARRESTS

Irish Boundary Settled; Remains as at Present

Free State relieved of obligation to assume part of public debt of United Kingdom as provided by treaty

LONDON, Dec. 4.—Settlement of the Irish boundary question has been arrived at and the terms of the settlement were announced last night. The new arrangement revokes Article 12 of the Anglo-Irish treaty providing for a boundary commission and leaves the territory of Ulster as settled by the treaty. The Free State is released from its obligation under Article Five of the treaty to assume a portion of the public debt of the United Kingdom.

HOTEL DAMAGE ACTION IS ON

Hugh Gillis Claims \$3,600 from Prince Rupert Hotel as Result of Fall

The civil case of Hugh Gillis vs. the Prince Rupert Hotel Co., Ltd., in which damages in the sum of \$3,600 is claimed as a result of the plaintiff having fallen into the basement of the hotel when he mistook a door in the beer parlor on September 4, commenced in the Supreme Court this morning before Mr. Justice Murphy and is continuing this afternoon. L. W. Palmore is appearing for the plaintiff and Milton Gonzales for the defendant company.

CHINESE FREED OF MURDER CHARGE IN PORT MOODY SHOOTING

NEW WESTMINSTER, Dec. 4.—Sue Ze and Chin Sar Yong, Chinese, were found not guilty of the murder of Lum by a jury in the assize court and given their liberty. The shooting took place on May 19 near Port Moody when three men died, Lum Bul, Ng O and Mao Dip, the latter taking his own life.

International Harvester Co. Buys Beaver Cove Pulp Plant; Will Spend Huge Sums There

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4.—Negotiations were completed yesterday between the trustees of the Beaver Cove Pulp & Paper Company near Port Hardy on Vancouver Island not far from Alert Bay and the International Harvester Company through the agency of C. S. Batten of Vancouver whereby the Harvester Company will advance up to \$16,000,000 to put this plant on a new one in operation in consideration of receiving sixty per cent of the capital stock.

December 15 is set for the date for the shareholders' meeting here and in Michigan to ratify the deal. Then all the creditors' claims totalling two million dollars will be paid.

RECOUNT IN PEACE RIVER

Judge Mahaffy Checking Over Votes in Large Constituency at Instance of Conservatives

EDMONTON, Dec. 4.—A recount is going on here in connection with the vote in the Peace River constituency in which the Progressive candidate Kennedy was declared elected. The recount was asked by the Conservative candidate. Judge Mahaffy has charge of the count and the first morning saw fifteen ballots set aside for future decision.

WOODWARD ADVISES SELLING P.G.E. AT COST IN ENGLAND

VICTORIA, Dec. 4.—The government was advised to make an effort to dispose of the P.G.E. Railway at cost to English capital by Charles Woodward, in the Legislature Thursday. He suggested the Premier, accompanied by businessmen, go to England and there attempt to get rid of the railroad.

CONFERENCE OF ALL LUMBERMEN

Experts from United States to Meet in Victoria Next Monday
