TO ARRANGE FOR BISHOP

This Will be one of Important Questions at Conference With Canon Gould Tonight

One of the most important matters to come up for consideration at the conference to be held this evening between Canon Gould, general secretary of the Church of England Missionary Society in Canada, and representatives of the district clergy and lay delegates will be the question of taking steps to have a Bishop of Caledonia appointed to succeed the late Archbishop F. H. Du Vernet. As the salary of a bishop in this district is contributed to by the Missionary Society, the district will have to make some arrangements to aid in the financing. If negotiations with this end in view are successfully carried out, the election of a bishop will follow later.

Among the members of the district clergy who are in the city to attend the conference are: Rural Dean T. J. Marsh of Terrace; Rev. J. B. Gibson of Smithers; Rev. E. Hodson of Ocean Falls; Rev. George J. Gray of Châtelet; Rev. T. D. Proctor of Hazelton; Rev. William Sweetnam of Endako; Rev. J. S. Brayfield of Anyox; Rev. A. W. R. Ashley of Stewart; Archdeacon G. A. Rix and Rev. Walter Allen of Prince Rupert will also attend. Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Page of Smithers are here as lay delegates to the conference.

provide a minister for every place in Canada where he was needed.

Mass Movement

Turning then to the question of missions, the speaker stated that any church which ceased missionary effort was dead. The church must be big enough to embrace all nationalities. The question of the desirability of missions was not a debatable one. It had been settled 1900 years ago. All they had to do was to obey orders. He gave instances of the hard work and endurance of the early missionaries and enthused his audience with the news that now at last success was being attained. In practically all the mission fields in which the United Church was interested there was a great awakening going on. Converts were coming in large numbers. There was in many places a mass movement toward Christianity.

Dr. Osterhout showed on the map the various places in which the Canadian missions were located. In Japan 27 churches had been built every year for the past 73 years. While the number of converts in China were fewer, the number being only 400,000, the Chinese were themselves sending missionaries to Tibet so that the work was being extended. In Korea there were 400 places of worship and 7,000 communicants. In Formosa there were 25 missionaries and 50 congregations.

In India the results were most encouraging. The mass movement toward Christianity had to be handled very carefully and only those who it was felt were really in earnest were received into the Church. The eighty missionaries there must be supported even if it took their bottom dollar. The Bible was being read by educated men all over the land. Even the prisoners in
