NOTABLE MEETING AT JASPER LODGE

Hayter Reed and Daughter of "Big Bear" McLean Hold Reunion

JASPER, Aug. 20.—To have been one of the members of a relief party, taking food to the daughters of "Big Bear" MacLean of Riel rebellion fame when they were held prisoners by the Indians in Northern Saskatchewan several decades ago, and this week to meet one of the ladies he then helped to rescue, was the experience of Hayter Reed, a guest at Jasper Park lodge during the last few days.

The lady in question, Miss Asa MacLean, was one of the three daughters of "Big Bear" MacLean, held prisoner by the Indians during the Riel outbreak and later released. When it was known that the MacLean family had been released a rescue party with food and clothing set out to meet them on the trail. Since that time Mr. Reed and Miss MacLean had not met until they came together in the rotunda of the Lodge at Jasper Park and discussed the incident in which they had both figured.
