WINNIPEG TO HAVE UNIQUE MEMORIAL
Street to be Named "Valor Road" in Honor of Three V.C.'s

WINNIPEG, July 15. — The bravery of three Winnipeg warriors who fought with the Canadian forces during the World War, will be impressed upon posterity by a permanent and unique memorial.
 It was recently discovered that three of Winnipeg's sons who earned the Victoria Cross had lived on the same street, within a block of one another, during peace times. Residents of the street, determined upon honoring their memory, petitioned the civic authorities for permission to change the name of the street to "Valor Road." The request was granted and on the initiative of the Women's Canadian Club, a memorial lamp has been unveiled at the intersection of the newly-named street and Portage Avenue.
 Only one of the three returned at the cessation of hostilities, that being Lieut.-Col. Robert Shankland. The other two F. W. Hall and Leo Clark, paid the supreme sacrifice. The former was killed at the Ypres salient on April 23, 1915, and it was during this battle, in which the Canadians generally distinguished themselves, that he won the Empire's highest military honor. Leo Clark was posthumously awarded the V.C. for outstanding bravery during the battle of the Somme, in 1916. Lieut.-Col. Shankland earned the coveted honor for consummate courage and initiative in leading his troops in one of the bitterest battles of the Western front.
