ROSE HARBOR HIGH STATION

Seventy Whales Handled There so Far This Season with 20 at Naden Harbor

VICTORIA, July 15. — One hundred and thirty whales is the catch of the Victoria Whaling Corporation's fleet so far this season, it is announced by Captain Le Marquand. They chiefly comprise sperms, finbacks and humps. The finback variety is the most valuable. Captain Le Marquand states, although the sperm whale produces the most oil. The latter variety, however, does not demand such a big price on the market as the other two varieties. The sperm whale, Captain Le Marquand said, is the most plentiful this year.

So far this season the Rose Harbor station is leading in the number of whales caught. Its record is seventy whales, followed next by Kyuquot whaling station with forty whales, and the Naden Harbor station with twenty whales.

"The whales are plentiful enough," stated Capt. Le Marquand, "but the rough weather has been against the whaling fleet. With better weather during the next few weeks we should catch up to last year's catch. Up to the present we are

ANTI-JAPANESE MOVE IN CHINA

Editor of Chinese Newspaper Blames This For Troubles There

VICTORIA, July 15. — "The real cause of the recent disturbances in Shanghai is an anti-Japanese attitude, which there is reason to suppose has been exploited by the Soviet," said H. G. W. Woodhead, editor of The Pekin and Pientsin Times, and of the China Year Book, who passed through Victoria, en route to Chicago aboard the President Madison.

Mr. Woodhead is going to Chicago to lecture in the university there under the auspices of the Norman Waite Harris Memorial Foundation. His lectures will be a series dealing with events leading up to the present crisis in China.

Trouble in Cotton Mills

There had been serious trouble in the Japanese cotton mills earlier in the year, which was revived in May when a party of agitators endeavored to break and destroy the plant of one of the Japanese mills. Mr. Woodhead said, in relating the incidents leading up to the present uprising. "The Japanese employees fired at and, it is alleged, killed one of the attacking party, with the result that serious disturbances were feared, and it was necessary to call out some of the local volunteers as a precautionary measure.

"The recent trouble was caused by student demonstrators, who, in defiance of the local municipal regulations which prohibit political or other demonstrations of any kind within the international settlement, paraded the streets, making anti-Japanese speeches. The arrest of some of the ringleaders of this lawless demonstration was followed by an attack upon the Louza police station, which had been attacked during the 1905 Mixed Courts riots. The police had no option but to fire, if the police station was to be preserved and a serious riot prevented," he continued.

So also are the captain-superintendent of police and most of the foreign members of the force; but it was by no means a national affair. The Shanghai Settlement is international. The chairman of the council at the moment is an American. There is also a Japanese councillor. The single aim of the council is to preserve order in a vast city which owes its growth to foreign enterprise and efficient foreign government. "The Chinese police at Tsingtao had to fire on the agitators there to drive them out of the mills they had occupied, and a recent telegram states that the Chinese merchant volunteers in Shanghai, outside settlement limits, fired on workers who refused to go on strike."

TOO MANY PEOPLE JAPAN'S TROUBLE

Government to Revise Regulations for Opening up and Cultivating Land

TOKYO, July 15.—The food and population problem still continues the most serious one confronting Japan. At a recent meeting of high officials of the Department of Agriculture and Forestry it was decided that the government should revise the regulations for opening up and bringing land under cultivation. The officials were of the opinion that there are considerable areas in Kokkaido and Korea which might be opened up and tilled if proper encouragement were offered settlers. It was stated that, while the area of land in Japan and the volume of foodstuffs have been materially increased, the rate of increase has begun to fall off lately and is not keeping pace with the increase of population.

Consequently, additional inducements are to be offered settlers in the districts which are still open to cultivation.
