Mechanized Farms Get More Mishaps

REGINA (CP)—Sixty per cent of Canada's farm accidents occur in the prairie provinces, although they have only one-third of Canada's farm population.

The reason, according to a survey here, is that prairie farming is more highly mechanized than other parts of the country. Tractors are one of the major accident causes, while combines and threshing machines add to the count.

While an official survey of farm accidents for this year has not yet been produced, there has been an unusually high number of tractor fatalities reported.

May Hold Carnival For Winter Tourists

QUEBEC (CP)—Members of Quebec's Junior Board of Trade believe that a winter carnival including oldtime and modern sports would prove a big attraction for tourists.

Included in their plans are a gigantic ice palace on the historic Plains of Abraham and colorful snowshoe races. A committee of eight has been set up to work out details.

Traditionally, the "Palais de Glace"—ice palace—is the central part of any winter carnival and Quebec has a spectacular spot to build it on the plains, high above the St. Lawrence River.

An attempt to revive the old-time carnivals was made by the senior board last year but it became part of a municipal project and financial difficulties blocked the way.

A new approach is being tried by the young business men. They've decided to enrol the support of all big associations and financial concerns have promised they will chip in to help if the carnival comes off.

SHOWS SLIGHT DROP

Of course the idea is largely to boost the winter tourist traffic in the city. Quebec City is more industrialized than it ever was but somehow the meat and potatoes of its economy still is the tourist industry. And that's been dropping off slightly.

This hilly city, with its peak-roofed stone houses, narrow streets and rugged countryside is a winter sports paradise and the home of hundreds of snowshoers. The sport was picked up, because it was practical, by early French settlers from the Indians.

If the project materializes the carnival will be held in January when the snow is deep and the weather really cold.

All types of competitions are planned but details haven't been worked out yet.

One thing is sure, the snowshoers in woolen headgear, tunics and blazing "ceintures flechees"—knitted multicolored woollen belts—will play a big part.

Tobacco Injurious To Youth, Church Convention Told

A commission appointed by the Fourteenth General Council of the United Church of Canada to study the effects of the use of tobacco told the 15th General Council meeting in Hamilton that "we believe that the United Church should teach that the use of tobacco by minors is physically injurious as well as an expensive habit. The Church should urge its youth to refrain from using tobacco, at least until the time of maturity."

The Commission said that it does not regard the distribution and use of tobacco as sinful. It is not in the same category as gambling and drunkenness, the Commission believes.

"We think the use of tobacco cannot generally be regarded as a matter of conscience."

Chairman of the commission was R. G. Groom, of Tillsonburg, and Rev. J. R. Mutchmor, secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service, was secretary.

The Commission strongly criticized the manner in which the tobacco industry is conducted. It says three great concerns in the U.S. control 78 per cent of the business and in Canada two firms have almost 90 per cent. It also criticizes the advertising of cigarettes and tobacco, particularly in regard to minors, and suggested the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation "keep it within bounds." It commented on the high price of cigarettes, estimated that 80 per cent of the men and 40 per cent of women in Canada smoke an average of 2,000 a year.

As to use of tobacco on church property, the commission held that this was a matter for the local church authorities to decide.

Allied Troops Hold Defence

SEOUL (CP)—Chinese Reds today fought off an Allied charge against the crest of Old Baldy Hill but failed to hold another western front peak they seized earlier in the day in heavy fighting in Western and Central Korea.

The Chinese company in pre-dawn darkness drove U.N. defenders from a low hill south of the true site of Panmunjon. The U.S. Eighth Army said an Allied patrol re-occupied the position later in the day without opposition as the Reds pulled out.

It was one of four Allied hills in the sector to be successfully defended against a Chinese battalion in a two-mile wide attack last night.
