MURDOCK SHOW SEEMS CLEVER

Oriental Show Attracting Large Audiences at Westholme Theatre

Murdock, "Famous White Mahatma," with his own company and "Show of Wonders" is drawing capacity houses at the Westholme Theatre. His production is quite unique, and it is evident that, during his engagement here which continues for two more days, he will have many people in Prince Rupert guessing and thinking.

The offering is divided into two parts. The first part discloses an Oriental stage setting, "The Temple Scene of India" with burning incense, hanging tapestries and beautifully costumed dancing girls who present a prologue to the act itself. Then follows a demonstration of telepathy and concentration. Several effects that are truly "brain twisters" are presented in lightning rapidity. TO HANDLE HARVESTERS

Railway Companies Large Movement to Prairies this Fall

MONTREAL, July 15.—Early preparations are being made this year to cope with the situation in the west as far as the harvesting of the wheat crop is concerned. From early spring it has been realized that the 1925 crop would be considerably in excess of that harvested last year and now, while no definite estimates can yet be made, it is expected that the crop will approach 375,000,000 bushels. If anything approaching this figure is reached it is apparent that it will be necessary to import a large number of harvest workers into the west to help handle it. Much of course still depends upon continued favorable conditions, but regardless of what transpires in the meantime the Canadian Railways are proceeding with their arrangements for the operation of harvesters excursions on the assumption that there is to be a bumper crop.

Already several preliminary meetings have been held between railway officials and government representatives with the result that it is now estimated that between 45,000 and 50,000 harvesters will be needed in the prairie provinces in addition to those available locally. In fact, the total estimate of help required in the west is 60,000 but several provinces figure that they can meet a part of these requirements by men available in the west. A meeting will be held at Winnipeg July 24, attended by officials of the various governments of the western provinces and representatives of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific at which more definite figures will be arrived at and this meeting will be followed by the formulation of the plans for obtaining and transporting the harvesters.

The arrangements for handling harvesters will be practically the same as in former years except on a larger scale, every available car of the colonial type will be pressed into use by both roads and the usual arrangements will be made to look after the comforts of the excursionists.
