BRINGING UP FATHER



Prince Rupert Beat Ketchikan at Baseball Yesterday when They Met at Acropolis Grounds

The locals played better baseball than the visitors so Prince Rupert won the first of the Fair Week baseball games from Ketchikan yesterday afternoon by a score of 6 to 2. Though the home players had the edge on the Ketchikanites all the way and excelled them in every department, it was an interesting match until the seventh inning, when the local batters touched "Blockie" Stewart, the visiting pitcher, for six hits and four runs. It was in this frame that a thick fog came up making it difficult for some of the runs made in that inning, but the advantage or handicap was even between the two teams and the locals got the best of it because the batters were able to find the ball and send a series of long clouds into the outfield and past.

Lidstone Pitched

Dannie Lidstone pitched for the home team throughout and kept the visitors guessing in such a way that he had fifteen strikeouts to his credit as against Stewart's eight. Vallance was the star batter for the locals and his hitting was responsible for several of the runs scored by Prince Rupert. With the bases full in the second inning he poled out a safe two-bagger which brought in two runs. Again in the seventh inning, Vallance started the local batting frenzy with a three-bagger that resulted in four runs being scored after several safe hits had been made, including two-baggers, by Lidstone and W. Mitchell. In the sixth inning, Sidney Bazett-Jones made a peg from right field to the home plate that will go down in local baseball history. It was one of the most accurate long-distance throws ever pulled off on the local diamond and, directed right into Balfour's mitt as he stood on the home plate, resulted in the base-runner being tagged out as he approached there. In the fifth inning, with no men down, the visitors ran into a double play when Jimmie Farquhar fielded an infield fly and, converting the ball to Moran at second, put a runner out there. The pitching of Lidstone being all that could be desired, and the catching of Balfour also being of first-rate order, the local battery throughout the game was given great support by the field and the only error chalked up against the locals was in the seventh inning, when Willie Mitchell might have been excused for dropping a high fly that, on account of the thick fog, was pretty hard to judge, especially in the difficult left-field position.

Visitors Stars
For the visitors Walls and Downs were perhaps the star players. The former played his position at second base in effective manner and also made two safe hits. Downs, besides making three good catches in left field got on the bases three of the four times he went to bat and, on bases, proved the most dangerous man of the visiting team. Ireland played an effective game as catcher for the visitors. There was little changing of the line-ups during the game, the only change being in the third inning, when Ackervik, the Ketchikan right fielder, after failing to negotiate an easy fly, was taken out and replaced by Edwards, who had played catcher for New Metlakatla in the series with Prince Rupert last week. A large crowd attended the game, which was umpired by P. Laporte, balls and strikes, and Gordon Evans, bases.
