CO-OPERATION WITH SMITHERS

Prince Rupert Visitors at Fair in Interior Meet Board of Trade There

SMITHERS, Sept. 9.—Taking advantage of the large number of Prince Rupert businessmen visiting in Smithers, President L. S. McGill of the local Board of Trade, arranged for a special meeting of the Board on Saturday night to which the visitors were invited and many matters of joint interest were brought up for discussion.

The question of reduced railway rates on shipments of Bulkley Valley farm products to Prince Rupert has been receiving considerable attention from both the Prince Rupert and the Smithers Boards of Trade and Geo. W. Nickerson, president of Prince Rupert Board, outlined to the meeting steps taken by his Board in their fight for cheaper rates. A slight reduction was granted by the Railway some time ago but there is still room for improvement and the matter was taken up with Sir Henry Thornton on his recent visit, as a result of which it is hoped that a further reduction will be made in the near future.

Assistance to Farmers

The local members explained to the visitors the reasons for their requests for more assistance to the farmers in the way of Illustration Stations and the meeting freely discussed this question, some being in favor of a central experimental farm and others of a number of stations, similar to the one on the Oulton farm, being placed in the different sections of the district. Geo. Oulton gave a history of the station of which he is in charge, and which now consists of 25 acres. The work at these stations is done under the supervision of A. E. Richards from the Summerland experimental station. Mr. Oulton considered this line of education of great benefit to the farmers throughout the district.

Fred Stork, federal member for the district, was present and he was asked for his co-operation in the extension of this work. The Prince Rupert members expressed themselves as willing to endorse and assist any project that might be advanced by the local body for the development and advancement of the great district for which Prince Rupert is the natural outlet, and the same co-operation was assured the visitors by Mr. McGill, on behalf of the Smithers Board.

INEQUALITY IN CITY WATER BYLAW CLAIMED

Pioneer Laundry Says It Would Be Cheaper to Keep Taps Open Continuously Than Part of Time

A letter from the Pioneer Laundry suggesting that the present scale of water rates charged by the city did not protect the small consumers, was read at last night's council meeting and referred to the utilities committee. The letter stated that the laundry used 58,500 cubic feet of water during August and had paid \$79.50, whereas, if 160,000 cubic feet, or three times as much, had been used the cost would have been less—\$72. It would thus have been of benefit to the laundry to keep the water running continuously, though it would work a hardship on householders in the vicinity in the matter of pressure. If this course were followed, the city would have to replace the present two-inch main with a three-inch at considerable cost. Consideration of the matter was asked in the letter.

BIG LOG BARGE ON MAIDEN TRIP

Hecate Straits Towing Co.'s Hulk Drumroch Will Bring First Load from Islands to Rupert

In tow of the company's tug Lorne, the Hecate Straits Towing Co.'s large steel log-carrying barge Drumroch will sail to-day

from Vancouver on her maiden voyage. The big hulk will go to Logan Inlet on the Queen Charlotte Islands and there load something in excess of one million feet of logs for delivery to the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills. The vessel should arrive here in the course of ten days or a fortnight.
