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**PARKING BYLAW BEFORE BOARD**

Delegation of Taxi Drivers Again Meets Police Commissioners

A delegation from the taxi drivers, consisting of E. Large and T. Dybhavn was present at the police commission yesterday when consideration was given to the drafting of a parking bylaw. At a previous meeting of the commission Solicitor Jones had been instructed to prepare the draft of a bylaw, and the same was submitted to the commission yesterday.

Commissioner Coombs and Mayor Newton were of the opinion that Sixth Street should be closed to parking, whereas Commissioner Montgomery was in favor of restricting parking on this street to the north side.

The matter was discussed at considerable length, and the side of the taxi drivers was presented to the board by the delegation present. In the end it was decided to recommend that no parking be done on Sixth Street, and that this be included in the draft by law which the commission would ask the city council to pass.

Other matters pertaining to the regulation of traffic were brought up for discussion by the board, and it is likely that several suggestions will be incorporated in the proposed draft by-law, which will call for no parking in front of a theatre or other places of public assembly, or in front of a fire hydrant, or within twenty feet of a street corner.

**MISS HARDING HAS RESIGNED**

New Domestic Science Teacher to be Engaged; Wood Fuel for Schools

The School Board met last evening in the Council Chamber at the city hall. President Orme was in the chair, and Trustees Rochester and Johnston together with secretary Vance were present.

The usual business of the month, being the passing of accounts and other business of a minor nature was all that came before the meeting.

The Board received with regret the resignation of Miss Harding, the Domestic Science

teacher, and the secretary was instructed to advertise for a successor. Miss Harding in her letter of resignation expressed her gratitude to the Board for the many courtesies which had been extended to her, and said that her stay in Prince Rupert had been a most enjoyable one.

Tenders had been asked by the Principal of the High School for a table for use in the laboratory and two tenders were received by the Board last evening. Mitchell & Currie tendered \$43.25 and J. L. Blain \$30, the latter one being accepted by the Board.

**BEER PARLORS WERE WARNED**

Better Patrol of City Discussed and Chief Given Another Man

The police commission met in the council chamber of the city hall yesterday afternoon when matters of a routine nature occupied the attention of the board. The extra work for the police department caused by the opening of the beer parlors was the subject of considerable discussion, and the commission seemed to be of the opinion that the holders of licenses could in some instances be held responsible for the manner in which they permitted their premises to become violators of the laws. The chief reported that he had warned offenders that the next time he would have to have a charge preferred unless a strict observance of the rules and regulations was adhered to. He also said that there were times when the force could not meet the situation properly in the matter of patrolling the streets at certain times of the day. He had engaged temporary assistance at various times, but the results were not always satisfactory and it would seem wise to employ a special policeman for a short period.

**LETTER OBJECTING TO UKRAINIAN PEOPLE COMING TO CANADA**

Trail Police Commission Says They Are Communists and Members of Red Army

The Trail Police Commission had a letter before the local police commission yesterday asking that they support a resolution which Trail Commission had passed to the effect that Dominion government do not encourage or assist 10,000 Ukrainians to come into this country as immigrants.

In the preamble of the resolution it was stated that these immigrants would not remain on the farm and that there were many of this class in the vicinity of Trail at the present time and they nearly all belonged to the Communist party or were members of the Ukrainian Red Army.

The commission did not discuss the matter very long and it was soon decided to take no part in the matter.

**BOOTH SCHOOL STILL LEAKING AND BOARD WILL INVESTIGATE**

The condition of the walls of the Booth School was a subject of discussion at the meeting of the School Board last night, it being reported that the school was still leaking.

It was the opinion of Trustee Rochester that the walls could never be made tight without tearing away the top part and rebuilding. Any other measure would be only throwing good money after bad. It seemed to be the idea of the Board that the matter should be considered as soon as possible, since it would only be making the matter much worse to permit it to go on as at present. Classes could not be held in some of the rooms and this condition should be corrected if possible without too much delay.
