Here to Investigate Power Situation with View to Development

ELECTION NOT DISCUSSED BY THE CABINET

Hon. Dr. King Says he Will Seek
Re-election in East Kootenay
If Nominated

VANCOUVER, Aug. 17.—Setting at rest rumors that he might seek to represent a coast constituency, Hon. Dr. King announced here before leaving for Ottawa that he will seek re-election in East Kootenay at the next federal election if nominated by the Liberals there. He said he expected to return in September to make a tour of British Columbia but added that the tour did not have any bearing on the possible election, which subject, he said, had not yet seriously been discussed by the cabinet.

BORDEN PLAN FOR DOMINIONS

Scheme Suggested to Have High
Commissioners Given Cab-
inet Standing

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 17.—Sir Robert Borden, former Unionist premier, speaking at the institute of politics here today, advocated that high commissioners of the Dominions in London be made members of their own governments and receive the status of imperial privy councillors to enable them to attend cabinet meetings in London when summoned.

In this way Sir Robert thinks the Dominions would be given adequate voice in the determination of British foreign policies.


RAILWAY LABOR C.N.R. BOARD

ATLANTIC MINES LOOKING WELL

Developments Going on Espe-
cially at Engineer and Kirk-
land Properties

That the Atlin mining district is developing fast is the word brought by A. J. Gaul, mining engineer or Stewart, who arrived from the north on the Princess Louise and is returning to Stewart today.

Mr. Gaul says the Ruffner property, a silver-lead mine on Fourth of July Creek has been taken over by the Guggenheim's and is being operated by them.

The engineer people are doing a lot of work. Extensive quarters are being erected for the employees and a hospital is being built. Lumber is still going in there. The power plant is being doubled and everything looks like progress there.

On the Kirkland property, which is an extension of the Engineer system controlled by Victoria people, they are starting to drive a crosscut tunnel and establishing a camp.

Mr. Gaul is enthused over the Atlin prospects and thinks great development will be seen there soon.

Ontario's Power Wizard Dies After Work Had Been Carried on with Success Many Years

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Sir Adam Beck, creator and architect of Ontario's great hydro power system and chairman of the Ontario Hydro-electric Power Commission, noted horseman, former cabinet minister and probably the best known man in the province, died shortly before midnight Saturday at his home here from pernicious anemia in his 68th year. He had been suffering for several months.

The funeral takes place in Hamilton.

Sir Adam, popularly known in this Province as the Minister of Power, was a native son of Ontario. He was born on June 20, 1857 at Baden, Ont., which was founded by his father. After having passed through the public school at Baden he attended the famous Dr. Tassie's school at Galt, then the Rockwood Academy, and afterwards the Western University, London, Ont., from which he graduated and which later conferred upon him the degree of LL.D.

Sir Adam, who was then simply Mr. Beck, in 1878 engaged in the iron foundry and milling business with his father, the late Jacob B. Beck, at Baden. In 1880 he removed to Galt, Ont., where he commenced the manufacture of boxes and the business of veneering thin lumber. He continued in this line for four years, then went to London, Ont., where he built an extensive plant, and established branches at Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton.

Began Work in 1903

The beginning of Sir Adam's great interest in the supply of cheap electric power to the people of Ontario began in 1903, when he was appointed a commissioner to investigate the development and distribution of electric power from Niagara Falls. In 1906 as Minister without portfolio in the Whitney provincial government Sir Adam Beck introduced a power bill in the Legislature, creating the Hydro-Electric Power Commission. He was appointed chairman of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission in June of that year. This position he continued to hold up to the time of his death.

He was first elected to the Legislature for London in 1902, and was re-elected for each succeeding term until the Provincial General Election in 1919, when he was defeated by H. A. Stevenson, Labor representative. Sir Adam was again elected to the

FEDERAL ELECTION MAY BE POSTPONED

Possibility of Another Session
Before Appeal is Made to
Country

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—There is a rumor here in Liberal circles that the general election may quite likely be postponed until after the next session of parliament. If it is held this year it will be not long before Christmas. To hold an election during the harvest or season of fall plowing on the prairies would seriously interfere with the work.

It is understood that if the government can secure some guarantee of support for the next session from the Progressives, they will go through another session but they refuse to carry on if the followers of Robert Forke continue to try to make political capital at their expense.

MAY START WORK SOON

John Dybahn Expects Tenders
to be Called For Biologi-
cal Station Here

While in Vancouver last week John Dybahn attended a meeting of the Pacific committee of the federal biological board and, as a result of that meeting, he expects that within a week or so tenders will be called for the erection of the biological station here on the site selected at the west end of the government wharf. Mr. Dybahn expects to receive plans and specifications for the structure at an early date. All difficulties that have stood in the way of getting the work started seem now to have been removed.

TRUSTEES FOR LOCAL RESORT

Local Men Named to Body that
Will Administer Park at

An order-in-council incorporating the resort surrounding the Salt Lake under the Parks' Act and providing for the appointment of a local board of trustees consisting of Dr. W. T. Kerin, C. H. Orme, Col. S. P. McDermid, J. H. Thompson and H. F. Pullen is now awaiting the signature of the Lieutenant Governor of the province, announces Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and local member, who arrived in the city from Victoria this morning. This will complete steps that were started by Mr. Pattullo to have the park brought under local control.

CANADA ELIMINATED FROM DAVIS CUP BY LOSING TO AUSTRALIA

Southern Contingent Tennis
Players Will Now be Match-
ed Against Japanese
Champions

MONTRÉAL, Aug. 17.—Victories for Patterson and James Anderson in the final singles contests in the second round of the Davis Cup series with Canada Saturday gave Australia a clean sweep, the visitors winning five matches to one. Anderson defeated Wright 6-2, 6-4, 6-1.

Australians now enter their third round. They will meet the Japanese players who eliminated Spain at Baltimore this week.

GOVERNOR CONCLUDES TRIP TO THE ARCTIC

Arrives in Edmonton and is Met
There by Lady Byng

EDMONTON, Aug. 17.—Concluding a month's trip to the Arctic during which he covered more than 4,000 miles since he left here on July 13, Governor General Byng arrived Saturday and was met by Lady Byng, who has spent the past month in British Columbia.

The governor spent four days in the General Hospital at Mr. and Mrs. Edward Clapp of this city.

NO ELECTION TO BE ANNOUNCED

Final Decision Will Await Arri-
val Home of Governor

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—This afternoon's meeting of the cabinet, to which particular significance is attached in view of the possibility of an election late in October or early in November, will be attended by Hon. P. C. Larkin, high commissioner in London, who arrived Saturday and spent the week end with the Premier.

The question of cabinet reorganization in the event of an election will be decided upon and continues to be a subject of discussion in political circles here.

Premier Dunning left for the West Saturday night. Whatever passed between Premier King and Premier Dunning during their conversations is unknown. Any announcement in this respect will probably await the decision on the question of an election. It is felt that no public announcement will be made in regard to a possible election until the Governor returns from the west next month.

REDUCTION OF TARIFF LIKELY

John Dybahn Expects This Will
be Outcome of Conference
Held Last Week in
Seattle

"As far as the Canadian representatives were concerned they received fair and satisfactory hearing and, in the evidence placed before the commission investigating the halibut tariff at Seattle last week and the preliminary report submitted, it was proved conclusively that a reduction of fifty per cent in the duty on Canadian halibut entering the United States is justified," declares John Dybahn, manager of the Royal Fish Co., who returned home on the Cardena last night after having attended the conference in Seattle.

There will be a conference in Washington on October 20 between the United States and Canadian governments on the matter of the halibut tariff and the commission in Seattle is anxious to have its report in the hands of the President of the United States by that time, Mr. Dybahn says. Until then it is not likely that any final decision will be reached or announced.

HAIL CAUSES MUCH DAMAGE
