MACKENZIE KING LIKELY TO RETAIN POWER

RETURNS SO FAR GIVE CONSERVATIVES 116 WITH FIVE TO HEAR FROM

Mackenzie King Government is Expected to Carry on Business of Country with Good Majority

Conservatives have only 116 sure and not likely to get many more; 100 straight Liberals returned

OTTAWA, Oct. 31.—Conditions have changed since yesterday, final results in a number of incomplete ridings reducing the number of Conservatives.

The general opinion here is that Mackenzie King will accept one of the seats offered him, will fill up his cabinet and carry on the government.

GEN. SARRAIL MUST EXPLAIN

France Recalls Governor of Syria in Order to Hear About Bombardment

PARIS, Oct. 31.—General Sarrail, French High Commissioner in Syria, has been ordered home to explain the bombardment of Damascus during the recent fighting.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Estimates placing the property damage during the French bombardment of Damascus at \$10,000,000 and the loss of life at 1,000, reached Washington this morning.

SHIP CAPTAIN IS ARRESTED

Material Witnesses in Murder Case Held Under Bail to Prevent Leaving Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Oct. 31.—Under instructions from Attorney General Manson, Captain Austin Laug, chief officer W. Sallsten, and four members of the crew of the American steamer Crofton Hall, due to sail from here tonight, were arrested as material witnesses in the charge of murder laid against Harold Verenstein, who is alleged to have stabbed to death a fellow seaman Exadisoff last Wednesday. The arrested men were released on bail and the charge will likely be heard in the assize court Monday in order to permit the sailing of the vessel as soon as possible.

TOOK BATH IN ILLICIT WINE

Prohibition Agent in Oakland Found it Difficult to Escape From Flood

OAKLAND, Cal., Oct. 31.—A concrete lined warehouse flooded with illicit wine provided a swimming pool for prohibition agent Sirard today. Sirard battered out the plugs of the vats which were seized Tuesday with the purpose of allowing the liquor to escape down the drains. However, the drains of the warehouse became clogged and the tide rose so rapidly that Sirard was hard put to escape. It is said his clothes suffered greatly from alcoholism.

MUCH GRAIN TO VANCOUVER

Four Times as Much so Far This Year as During Last Season

WINNIPEG, Oct. 31.—During the past week 673 cars of grain have been delivered at Vancouver by the Canadian National bringing the total for the season so far by that route up to 3,309 cars. This is more than four times as much as the deliveries there up to the same date last year.

REPRIEVE GRANTED TWO MURDERERS WHO KILLED CAPT. GILLIS

VICTORIA, Oct. 31.—Mr. Justice Murphy yesterday granted the application of Owen Baker and Harry Sowash for postponement of execution until January 14, in view of their appeals now pending against the death sentence. Each is asking for a new trial for technical reasons.
