**SITUATION IN CHINA TODAY**

Missionary Addresses Gyro Club at Victoria of National Revival in China

VICTORIA, Oct. 31—“We must wipe out racial hatred in this country of ours. We must strangle it before it swamps us and face the facts as they are and give the Chinese a square deal. I would not call the Chinese heathens. I prefer the name non-Christians,” declared Captain A. J. Brace, F.R.G.S., during the course of an interesting address on China at the weekly luncheon of the Victoria Gyro Club.


Captain Brace explained that the time of static in China was over and that nation was in flux. The recent war taught the Chinese two things, namely, self-determination and self-realization. They decided no longer to sign treaties at the point of the bayonet, as they had been forced to do in previous years. The students banded themselves together to resist, even at the cost of their lives, the exploitation of their country by outsiders.

The speaker declared that the Chinese demanded two things of all innovations in their country. “Is it true?” and “Will it work?” He stated that the great republic was being industrialized and quoted two instances to illustrate the difference between industries controlled by whites and those by people of the yellow race.

Captain Brace observed that one cotton firm in Shanghai controlled by whites secured one million dollars a year in profits by “sweatshop” methods. A body of young men formed the Commercial Press of Shanghai and now possessed 3,000 employees. It paid high wages, gave ample time for recreation, cared well

**TOWN OF HERRIN IS TRYING TO FORGET BLOODSHED SCENES**

Gun Toters Have Been Eliminated, and Religious and Industrial Activity Are Revived

HERRIN, Ill., Oct. 31.—A sign in a store window reads: “Former Herrin tailor returned; firm under a new name.”

It is a sign of the times in Herrin. Change the name and there would be few visible indications that here is the town which wrote its name in blood. They are returning to Herrin—the people who went away while the “war” raged—and the town is trying to heal its wounds. Ten widows, 28 orphans, and 43 dead men are hard to forget.

Among many reasons for the town's come-back these are outstanding: Elimination of the champion gun toter; a religious revival; a return of activity in the coal fields.

There are many other signs of regeneration. Bank deposits in two weeks this fall jumped \$50,000. Two chain stores have opened branch houses, one a grocery concern, the other a national music house.

At the beginning of this coal season, three banks were handling a monthly payroll of more than \$700,000. In 1924 there were 47 mines operating in Williamson county, producing almost 10 million tons of coal a year and employing more than 12,000 miners. In 1925 more than 20 mines closed. The mines are opening rapidly. Stores are starting up. Empty houses are being occupied.

It is estimated 200 families left Herrin during the interneeine strife. Property depreciated 50 per cent. There were bankruptcies, stagnation and despair.

**BAD WEATHER HARD ON PRAIRIE CROPS**

Situation in Southern Alberta is Particularly Discouraging Says George W. Morrow

After a business trip to the prairies which took him as far east as Winnipeg, George W. Morrow, former business man of this city and now identified with the National Biscuit Co. of Vancouver, reached the city on last night's train accompanied by Mrs. Morrow whom he met at Calgary. Mr. Morrow found conditions in certain parts of the prairies rather discouraging on account of the recent inclement weather which has prevented harvesting of the crops. Southern Alberta has suffered most and in five weeks there has been 28 inches of snow in that district. The greater portion of the crop has not yet been threshed there. There was a splendid crop about ready to be harvested and it is a sore sight to see it going to waste, he says.

The situation in Northern Alberta and in Manitoba, where the greater portion of the crops have already been harvested, is of course much better.
