



GIRL IS SWEEPED THROUGH SEWER

Rescued After Two Days in Underground Channel Neighborhood of Milan

ROME, Oct. 19.—An astonishing and terrifying adventure which befell a Milanese domestic servant the other day has stirred the imagination of all Italy.

Virginia Goe, aged about 30, had for eight years served the family of Signor Meyer of Milan, and had won the appreciation and affection of her employers. But latterly she had been afflicted by neurasthenia which deprived her of all enjoyment of life, and very early on Thursday last, leaving a laconic word of farewell in her room, she went out to seek death in the waters of the Naviglio, or Milan canal, into which she threw herself from the so-called Sirens' Bridge somewhat before dawn. Down this canal she was carried some way until a watchman espied her and attempted a rescue, but in vain. He called two other bystanders but none of the three could swim, and their efforts to throw ropes and sticks to the young woman were unavailing. To their horror they then saw she was being sucked towards the entrance to an underground channel system, into which she swiftly disappeared, calling frantically for help.

The Irish Senatorial elections have been little better than a farce says the Manchester Guardian. Few electors went to the poll—about 10 per cent, it is estimated, of the whole number. The elections were held by Proportional Representation, but by Proportional Representation, under the most impossible conditions. The whole of the Irish Free State, with over a million voters, was treated as one constituency, and a ballot-paper two feet long was presented to the unhappy voter containing the names of 76 candidates, mostly unknown to him, for 19 seats. No wonder that in despair he was inclined in many cases to treat the whole thing as a bad joke. Add to this that the powers of the Irish Upper House are restricted, that the whole conception of it is of a non-party body, and that no important issues appear to have been involved in the election, and it is not wonderful that the average elector showed himself somewhat apathetic. None the less, the few persons who took the trouble to vote may have succeeded in returning quite creditable representatives.
