The Stewart Board of Trade is pressing the government for a better set-up in the telegraph station here. Much delay is caused through present inadequate facilities.

At a meeting of the Stewart General Hospital Association held last Friday, the resignation of the matron, Mrs. M. McDonald, RN, was received. Mrs. McDonald will be leaving at the end of October. The board expressed regret and paid a tribute to the service rendered by Mrs. McDonald during her association with the hospital.

Repairs to the hospital were discussed and a committee was appointed to look into the matter and report at next meeting. The Provincial government has signified it will bear a part of the cost provided that estimates are submitted to the department.

Taciturn, Expressionless Zorin

New Moscow Delegate to U.N. Arrives

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—A leading Moscow tough guy has come to New York to be Moscow's spokesman at the United Nations.

Taciturn, robot-like and expressionless Valerian Alexandrovitch Zorin, 50, takes his place of suave, talkative Jacob Malik as the Soviet Union's chief U.N. delegate.

Zorin is suspected of having pushed through the seizure of Communist Czechoslovakia, of

bullying the ailing Czech foreign minister Jan Masaryk into bending to Moscow's will, and signalling the Communist purges in Czechoslovakia.

In March, 1945, when president Eduard Benes and his exiled government returned to liberated Czechoslovakia, Zorin became Soviet ambassador to Prague. He used the threat of Soviet arms to force the new Czechoslovak government to assign key posts to the Communists. Soviet armies had taken Prague, and Soviet authorities

kept Benes from any close association with western Europe.

SECRET TREATY
It was Zorin who pushed through the Czech-Soviet treaty ceding to the U.S.S.R. the Carpathian Ruthenia area. He also engineered the secret 1945 treaty granting the U.S.S.R. exclusive rights to exploit Czechoslovak uranium mines in the Jachymov region.

In 1947 Zorin went back to Moscow and was made a deputy foreign minister. But he returned to Prague soon after.

He arrived at Ruzyn airport early in February, 1948. Foreign minister Masaryk was ill and Vladimir Clementis — recently purged — was among ministry officials sent to receive him. Zorin announced he had come to Prague to "supervise Russian grain deliveries" to Czechoslovakia.

Jan Papanek, former Czech delegate at the United Nations who quit and won refuge in the United States, says Zorin's arrival leaves little hope for improvement of Soviet relations with the rest of the U.N.

Zorin is generally regarded by those who met him once before in the United Nations as a man of mediocre talent but one of fanatic vision to the cause of world Communism.

Drama classes in the syllabus will be presented at the October meeting.
