WILL VISIT FALLS RIVER

Lorne Campbell to Make Trip There Accompanied by J. Fred Ritchie

Lorne A. Campbell, vice-president of the West Kootenay Power & Light Co., who is in the city for the purpose of investigating hydro-electric development possibilities, will leave this afternoon to make an inspection of Falls River where development, if any, is ultimately decided upon, will probably take place. He will be accompanied by J. Fred Ritchie, who knows the local situation well and who is an old friend from Rossland of Mr. Campbell. Yesterday Mr. Campbell visited the municipal plant at Shawatlans which, though small, he says seems very satisfactory.

Mr. Campbell says that any plans in connection with power development are still only in the embryo stage. He is only looking over the possibilities and nothing whatever has been decided upon. One important thing that will have to take place before power is ever developed here will be the establishment of a market for it.

recommend a cut in the halibut duty so as to avert the danger of Prince Rupert being closed to American fishing vessels.

"I urged the greatest possible freedom for all concerned in the halibut industry, but the chairman of the commission said nothing more than an adjustment of the existing American tariff could be hoped for, as, while the President possessed the power to raise or lower the present tariff, he did not possess reciprocal powers, which would have to be first sanctioned by the United States senate.

Cold Storage Help

"The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. retained able counsel to support Mr. Nicholl's viewpoint, and this made it very much easier for the other local delegates to present their views.

"Witnesses for the applicants for the duty reduction testified that American fishermen now enjoy the same privileges at Prince Rupert as Canadians; also that Americans now obtain an average of two cents a pound more for their fish on the Prince Rupert halibut exchange than the Canadians.

Closing the Port

Speaking further to his report, the mayor said that, while the commission had expressed the desire to safeguard American interests as presented from the Ketchikan viewpoint, the possibility of Prince Rupert being closed to American fishermen had been recognized. If this happened, the commission was inclined to feel that it would mean a higher price for halibut to the American consumer. This, in a measure, seemed to offset Ketchikan's claim for a continuation of the present tariff. No one could definitely anticipate what the final finding of the commission would be but it seemed probable that a recommendation for the lowering of the tariff would be made.

GOVERNMENT ASKS FOR SEPARATE HEARING OF B.C. GRAIN RATE CASE

VANCOUVER, Aug. 18. — The British Columbia government through G. G. McGeer, K.C., has made application to the board of railway commissioners for a separate date for the hearing of the grain rate case. No reply has been received yet.

JAPANESE CREW OF EMPRESS LEFT HER

YOKOHAMA, Aug. 18.—Three hundred and forty Japanese members of the crew of the Empress of Australia walked off the ship today forcing the vessel to sail for Vancouver with a crew of 89.

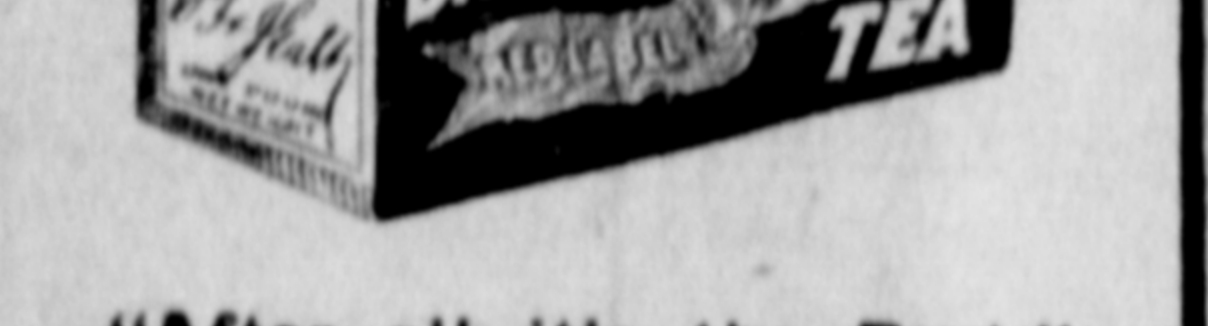
