Free Fish Given to Vancouver Families in Government Test

VANCOUVER (P)-The Federal government is feeding 64 Vancouver families free fish once or twice a month.

The families are members of a government sponsored fish-testing panel. Their job is to test the effect in freshness

and taste of different methods of handling. The fish are caught by the Fisheries Research Board's boat Tauganaga and the object of the experiments is to test the relative merits of freezing the fish at various stages against simply keeping it cooled on ice.
