JUNIOR SOCCER CUP PRESENTED

Enthusiastic Affair Last Night was Attended by About Fifty Boys

One of the most important and enthusiastic events of the season as far as the Junior Footballers are concerned took place last night in the El Regis Cafe when the Rochester Shield was presented to the team representing Booth Memorial School, winner of the championship this year. A banquet was held under the auspices of the Prince Rupert Football Association, President George Hill in the chair. About fifty boys attended from Booth, Borden and High Schools.

After full justice had been done to the delicacies of the festive board, Ex-Mayor Harry B. Rochester, donor of the shield, presented the trophy to Tom Kelsey, captain of the Booth School team, who made a neat reply.

There were speeches by Miss S. A. Mills, principal of Borden Street School, D. H. Hartness of the Booth School and J. C. Brady of the High School. James Black, vice-president of the Prince Rupert Football Association, and Mayor Newton also addressed the boys and there were short speeches as well by W. E. Willisroff, Jack Campbell and George Cochran who, on behalf of the Association, looked after the interests of the respective teams during the season.

W. Vaughan Davies presided at the piano for community singing. C. H. Orme, chairman of the school board, and Mrs. T. M. Spencer, president of the Parent-Teachers' Association, were to have been in attendance but were unavoidably prevented from appearing.

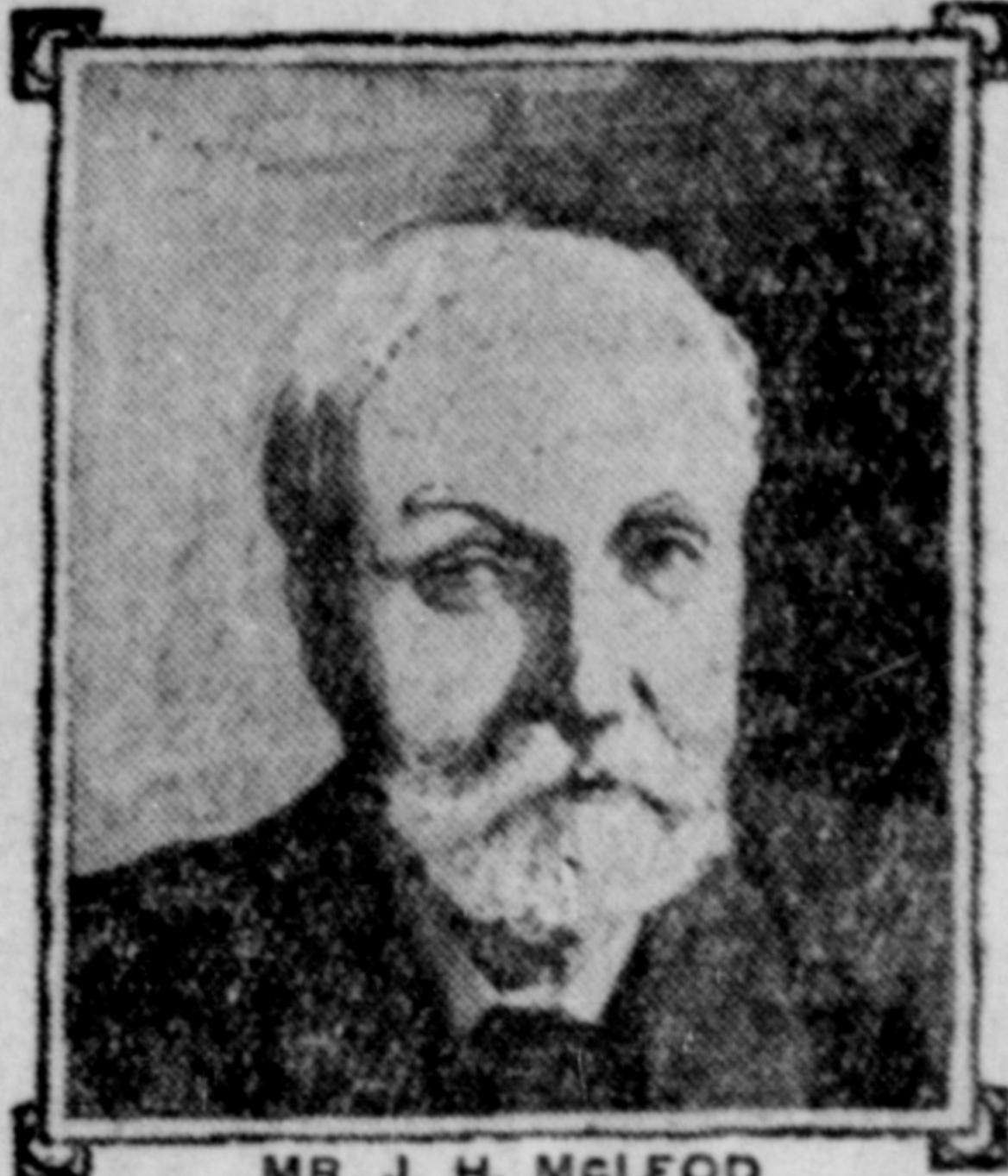
