"The Light of Western Stars," the latest of the Zane Grey novels to be transferred to the screen by Paramount, is a roaring Western romance of the picturesque Arizona border, packed with vital drama, heroic deeds and dark villainies—a leaf torn from the gripping story of the West in which is pictured the last desperate stand of banded outlaws on the remaining vestige of frontier America.
