NATIVE MUSEUM AT KITWANGA

John Laknitz Establishes Curio Shop and Show Place at His House

Probably the first Indian museum in the country has been established at Kitwanga by John Laknitz, a native of that place, who has turned the front room of his house into a show place for tourists.

Harlan I. Smith, Dominion archeologist, who came in from there yesterday, encourages the Kitwanga people to make use of their resources in this line, to clean up their village and make it attractive to the visitors.

Anything to do with the Indians or with natural history interests Mr. Smith. He has sent out a number of requests for information regarding Indian markings and recently received a letter from G. H. McCallum containing the following paragraph:

"I have come across one case of Indian markings on the rocks at mile 91.9 on this division of the C.N. Railway. It is about fifty feet from the track on a rock bluff on the north side and is easily found. It consists of faces and symbols in the fashion of the coast Indians painted on the rock with a terra cotta colored paint.

PATTULLO TELLS OF ACTIVITIES HERE

Says There is New Spirit in this City People Making Their Homes Here Now

Prince Rupert, the metropolis of Northern British Columbia, is making steady progress, according to Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, who arrived from the North Tuesday, says the Vancouver Province.

"All that Prince Rupert now needs to give it new impetus is power for manufacturing purposes," said Mr. Pattullo. "The district has all the necessary resources of agriculture, timber, fishing and mining, and rail and water transportation. What is now required is power for manufacturing purposes, is simply a matter of getting a sufficient initial load to start the undertaking and to this end the citizens are now bending their every effort.

"There is a new spirit in Prince Rupert. Where formerly many who went in did so with the idea of eventually moving elsewhere, the contrary opinion is now held. Those who came in the early days have all done well, and when conditions are compared with conditions in other portions of the world they believe that their lot is a happy one.

"Adjacent to Prince Rupert there are hundreds of nooks and bays that are delightful to the eye, with the best of fishing and hunting on the Coast. In the early days the government placed a reserve on practically all government lands adjacent to Prince Rupert. The residents are now asking that these lands be offered for sale as they are desirous of purchasing suburban homes in the numerous beauty spots.

PRINCE RUPERT HAS SMALL FIRE LOSSES

City Occupies Envidable Position in Report of Fire Marshals for Province

Perhaps the abundant rainfall this city gets or the efficient fire department it possesses or perhaps both are factors in the enviable position Prince Rupert holds from a fire standpoint.

The annual report of the provincial fire marshal which has just made its appearance shows that during the year 1924 the city suffered the small loss of \$1,345 from fire. Of the 31 city municipalities in the province, there were nineteen that had greater fire loss than this. They were

Chilliwack, Cranbrook, Fernie, Kelowna, Ladysmith, Merritt, Nanaimo, New Westminster, North Alberni, Port-Georgian, Port Alberni, Port Moody, Prince George, Revelstoke, Rossland, Salmon Arm, Vancouver, Vernon and Victoria, many of which are much smaller cities than Prince Rupert in point of population.

The loss in Prince Rupert fire district, totalling \$22,804, was smaller than in all the other fifteen fire districts of the province with the exception of Hazelton and Kamloops.

The reports shows that of the 4,682 fires in the province during the year 261 were caused by sparks from chimneys. Chief other causes of fires were defective chimneys, exposure and smokers' carelessness.

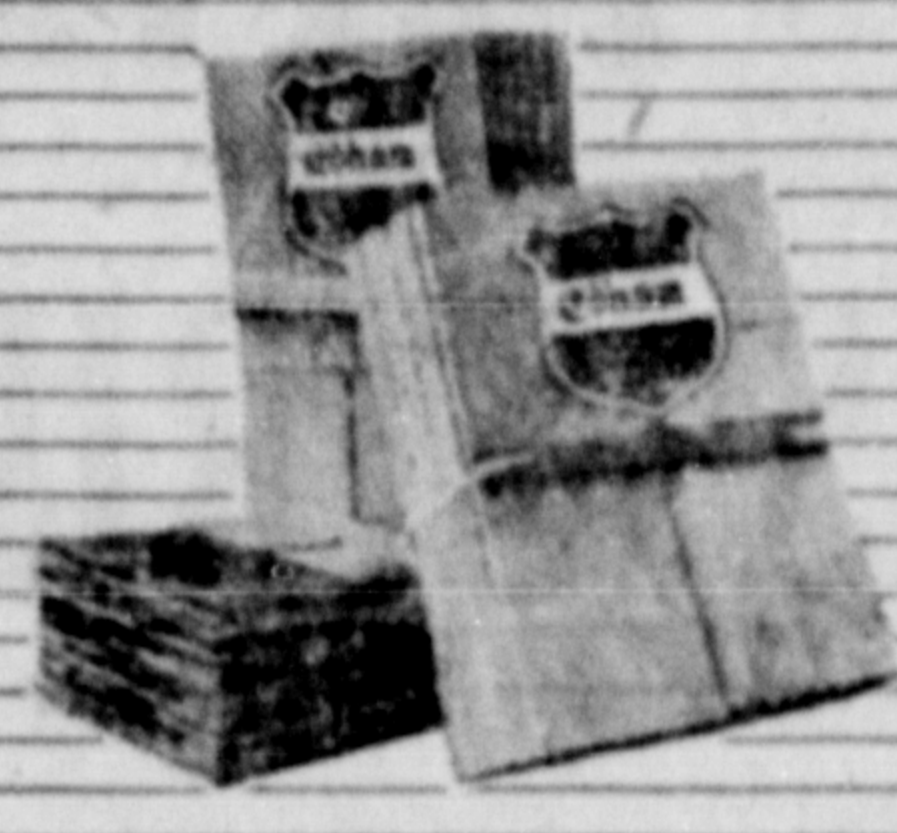
