Editor of Daily News Goes Holidaying Mountain Philosophy

TRIUMPH BAY, Gardner Canal. — Every time I see immense mountains I wonder if we do not very much over-estimate ourselves. Looking at any mountain reminds us how small we are and looking at mountains such as those I have seen today reminds us how incompetent we are to do anything real big or beautiful.

Set a man to make a mountain and what will he do? He might possibly imitate the size although even that is doubtful but he could never imitate the perfect artistry displayed in the work of nature. Whoever made those mountains was some being so far greater than man that it is impossible to think of them in the same terms.

Beneath the shade of the stupendous work of the great artist it is almost impossible to conceive of men disputing over such trivial things as Church Union, religious denominations or beliefs, the meaning of scripture texts, the right or wrong of prohibition, gambling, smoking, Sabbath observance, and the hundred and one little problems that often make life miserable for some people. The mountains stand as one of the tokens of the greatness of the Creator and the pettiness of mankind.

We decided not to go any farther than Brin River, not because we were tired of it but because Dick must be home at the first of the week and Gwen, like many other females, is somewhat uncertain. Dick says she was out all night with a swell and after that could not be depended on. At any rate we are homeward bound but are taking in some of the side shows we passed up last week. Triumph Bay is one of them. We are close to the foot of a waterfall and, as we sit, can look up the narrow bay a couple of miles. We have been amusing ourselves trying to find goat on the mountain in front of us with the binoculars. So far we have not succeeded. A water ouzel is curiously on the rocks among the riffles and I suppose it is from the habit of bobbing that it gets its name "dipper." The sun set an hour ago and it is now

dusk although light enough to read without artificial illumination.

Lunch at Long Bay

This morning we took a run up Long Bay. We took several photos of the mountains there and had lunch at the mouth of a mountain rill but the deer flies were very bothersome, the only place they have worried us since we left. There has been a few but not persistent like the Long Bay flies.

We propose testing the stream here for trout in the morning. It has a good reputation and we have done hardly any fishing so far. There has been little time. We take a lot of time getting our meals and preparing camp. Last night we slept in the open and propose doing the same tonight. As long as the flies are not bad it is rather attractive. Here there are a few little black beach flies but they are already ceasing from troubling.

I have just stopped to make up the bonfire in order to try to get enough light to finish this. We have no other light except a flashlight and one cannot write by it very well.

Beds have yet to be made up and then we turn in after giving the launch the once-over to see if she is all right. We expect to spend a good deal of tomorrow right here.

ESKIMO BEING EXTERMINATED

Are Falling Prey to Diseases of Civilization Says Mounted Police Medical Officer

EDMONTON, July 31. — Not many years will elapse before the Eskimo will be exterminated by disease through adopting white men's method of habitation, declared Dr. D. E. Scott, who recently returned to Edmonton after spending one year at Akhlavik in the delta of the McKenzie River. He has been acting as medical officer to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Arctic posts, and working among Indians and Eskimos in behalf of the department of Indian affairs.

While this prediction has been made by others in the past, Dr. Scott adds that Eskimos and Indians of the Delta are also suffering from intestinal parasitic attacks, due to eating raw fish, rabbits and other meats. This, however, he claims, is not a serious problem to contend with, but such diseases as cancer, appendicitis, he states are becoming too prevalent among the Indians.

In the old days when snow houses were their temporary homes, the Eskimos were healthy, states the doctor, but since they commenced living in cabins and shacks, tuberculosis has broken out among them, and this dread menace threatens to wipe them out. Among the Delta Indians, Dr. Scott found that in all but ten per cent there were symptoms of tuberculosis. Their methods of living were such that the disease was on the increase.
