BATTLE WITH AN OCTOPUS

Huge Creature Weighed More Than 120 Pounds and Had Nine and Half Feet Spread

SEATTLE, Sept. 25.—After a life and death battle with three men, and with two spears and a pike pole in its slimy carcass before it was subdued, an octopus, terror of bathers, weighing more than 120 pounds, was yesterday afternoon landed from the waters of the sound about 100 feet in front of the residence of Herbert Cormode, its captor, 7043 Beach Drive.

Cormode was out in his boat spearing sole when the monster showed one of its long tentacles, and Cormode believes, intended to reach up into the boat from the rocks to which it was clinging with a good hold.

Octopus Gives Fight

Cormode thrust his spear into the devilfish and called for help. Two other men rowed out to his aid and armed with another spear and pike pole gave battle to the now thoroughly infuriated creature which was wildly casting its tentacles across the bow of the frail row boat in an apparent effort to draw the bow under water.

After a fight of more than 20 minutes during which the fortunes of war changed from side to side, the octopus began to weaken and was later hauled into the boat.

Here again it commenced a battle with its captors and with a lunge threw one of its tentacles around the foot and ankle of young Cormode. Fortunately he was armed with a hunting knife and with this he severed the slimy arm.

The monster had a spread of nine and a half feet from tip to tip of its many tentacles.

CROOKS MEET WITH POLICE

Interview Head of Morality Squad to Know if They Really Mean Business

VANCOUVER, Sept. 25.—Without compare in police annals of Canada is the action of Viceland in sending a delegation of men who live on the avails of immoral women, of gamblers, crooks, and confidence men, to see the Chief Inspector of the Morality Department, John Jackson, at headquarters asking for "the straight tip" on that "go to work or get out" order.

Tipsters, three-card men and crooks of all kinds, including men who live off the immoral earnings of women, sent representatives, and in the private office of Inspector Jackson they faced the official and were told that Vancouver was no longer a haven for their ilk.

Warned to Get Out

They were told at a meeting unique in city history that the full force of the law would be unleashed against the entrenched forces of vice and that trains could not leave fast enough with men who organize law-breaking.

Inspector Jackson today expressed astonishment at the nerve of these men, known to him personally, who met in formal conclave yesterday and elected their flashiest spokesmen to make a full-dress call on the police in their very hair.

Hitherto they have been protected, not by the bluecoated officers, but by a weakness in the law itself.

Ruling Helps Police

Police have been handicapped by a ruling that possession of money prevented conviction on vagrancy charges. But the judgment of the higher courts last week that money is in itself no protection, and a legitimate occupation must be shown, has removed a barrier. So, when the police began their drive and cells were filled with "men of easy life," the quarry wanted to know. And they thought the best place to find out was headquarters itself.

Inspector Jackson told the men to get out, even the delegation, and to vanish from Vancouver within 48 hours or show where they were working.

VISIT OF MRS. BOOTH TO 'PEG

Wife of Salvation Army Head to Address Great Gatherings at Manitoba Capital

WINNIPEG, Sept. 25.—An elaborate program has been prepared for the visit to this city of Mrs. Bramwell Booth, wife of General Booth, head of the Salvation Army. Mrs. Booth is making the trip with the object of meeting army officials when they assemble in Winnipeg for the 13rd annual congress at which representatives covering the territory from Port Arthur to Alaska will be present.

On Friday evening, Oct. 9, there will be a mammoth historical pageant, which will be given in the Amphitheatre rink on October 10. In the afternoon there will be a parade. Following this there will be a reception at the city hall, when His Worship the Mayor will welcome Mrs. Booth on behalf of the city of Winnipeg.

On Sunday Mrs. Booth will conduct three great meetings in the Winnipeg rink. At the afternoon meeting the chair will be taken by Lieut.-Governor Sir James Aikens.

Mrs. Booth through all her life has been active in work of the Army. Many years ago she made a beginning in the social work of the Salvation Army which has since grown to very large proportions, and been extended to almost every country in the world. Until recently she held the position of British commissioner, being in charge of the general work of the Army in Great Britain.
