

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WILL SUPPORT A TARIFF REDUCTION

Forthcoming Halibut Conference in Seattle Mentioned at Board of Trade Meeting

The deputy minister of marine and fisheries in a communication last night advised the local board of trade concerning the conference to be held in Seattle on August 10 for the purpose of discussing the tariff on halibut. When the matter was brought to the attention of the board, the president stated that he was attending the conference as a representative of the halibut boat owners, and would be interested in trying to have the duty on halibut entering the United States removed. The suggestion seemed to be very favorably received by the members present and it was agreed that one half of the expenses of his trip be paid by the board of trade.

Matter of Making Change in Method of Electing Aldermen is Discussed by City Council

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 8.—Ald. Guest at the last meeting of the city council brought up the matter of abolishing the ward system in the election of aldermen. He, Ald. Fraser and Mayor Alward favored the change while Ald. Lambert and Ald. Patterson voiced their dissent. In order to make the change, it will be necessary to secure a petition representing one half of the assessed owners on a valuation basis or by plebiscite at the next municipal election. No action has yet been taken. The two-year system for election of aldermen cannot be put into effect unless the change is made.
