Radio Expands Despite Rivalry From Television

NEW YORK (AP)—Radios still are out-selling television sets in the United States by two-to-one, according to latest industry statistics.

Furthermore, radio continues to confound the prophets of its doom by establishing new peaks in number of stations on the air, sales of broadcast time and number of sets in use—despite television.

While television was introduced on Canadian Broadcasting Corporation stations only this September, it has been growing spectacularly in the United States for five years. But in the same time radio has scored impressive gains of its own.

MANY NEW STATIONS

Against 1,100 standard radio stations and 230 FM outlets five years ago, the United States now has 2,353 standard stations and 635 FM (frequency modulation) stations on the air. Five years ago, there were 61,000,000 radio sets in use. Now the total is 105,000,000. Television's overall total is estimated at 18,000,000.

Radio stations and networks did \$374,000,000 worth of business in broadcast time sales to sponsors in 1947. This year's total is expected to equal or surpass the record of \$455,000,000 set last year.

However, even with only 109 stations on the air, television already has surpassed radio in some respects in this country.

EXPENSIVE SETS

The TV set costs four or five times as much as a radio, and the sale of television sets represents more than three times the dollar volume of radio set business.

Television has cut sharply into radio's night time audiences, a fact recognized by the networks in making 10 to 15 per cent reductions last year, and further reductions by the two networks in the past month ranging up to 30 per cent.

Nevertheless, on an overall basis radio has continued to grow despite television, and the Federal Communications Commission has a file of more than 300 applications from persons who want to build new radio stations.

WOULD REDUCE FEES

VANCOUVER (CP)—The B. C. Automobile Association has asked the Provincial Government to reduce automobile licence fees to a flat \$10, instead of the present system of charging by weight with a maximum of \$25.

Woman Keeps Pound For B.C. Ranchers

WILLIAMS LAKE, B.C. (CP)—Hazel Exshaw, slight, middle-aged woman, is pound-keeper in this hub of the British Columbia ranching country and village commissioners regard her as the logical person for the job.

Most of her life has been spent on a ranch. Born in Washington State, she can still mount a horse as nimbly as a 16-year-old. She has laughing brown eyes and a trim figure weighing 125 pounds.

Mrs. Exshaw won the annual stamped pony express relay race for women in 1927 and again in 1930.

Stock does not roam at will through the village, but occasionally a band will jump a near-by ranch fence. "My job," she says, "is to prevent trouble. If wandering stock enters the village, I notify the owner of its whereabouts. If the owner ignores the warning after a reasonable time the animals are impounded."
