FRUITS FEATURE LOCAL MARKETS

Many Varieties Being Offered—Butter Holding Firm—Slight Advance in Sugar

Outdoor tomatoes are now plentiful on the local market and are selling at two pounds for 35c or 75 cents for a 5 lb. basket. Semi-hot house tomatoes are selling for 95c for a 5-lb. basket.

Freestone preserving peaches are now plentiful and retail around 82 per crate. It is not expected that prices will be lower but rather an advance is prophesied.

Preserving plums are now at their best. The price runs from \$3 to \$3.75 according to the particular variety wanted. The buying public should not confuse plums with the prune variety which will be on the market at lowest price about September 1. Preserving Bartlett Pears, wrapped fancy stock, are now on the market but the price is high. A big saving can be made by waiting for local B.C. unwrapped stock which will commence to arrive about the latter part of this month.

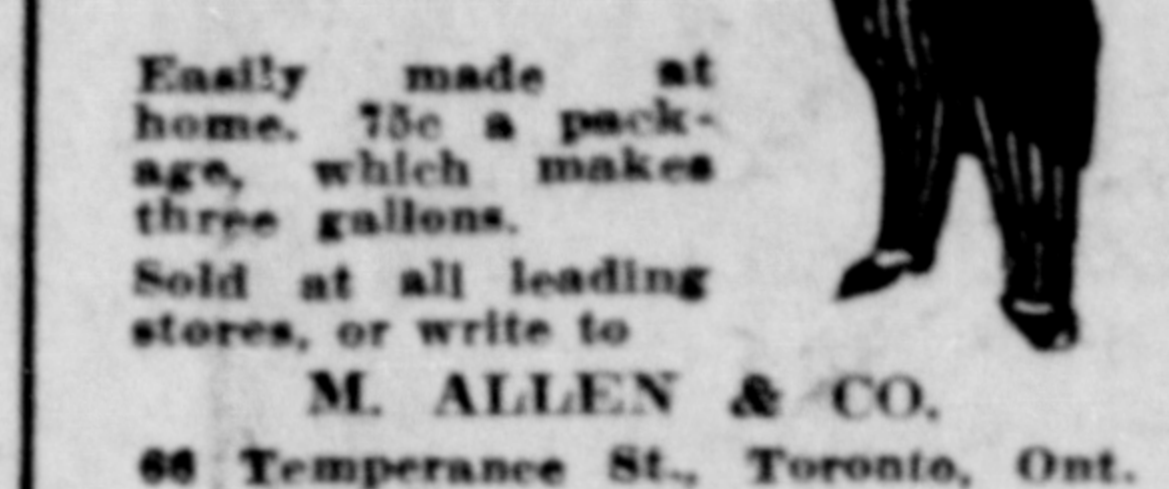
Golden Bantam Corn is due in about ten days. Raspberries are now plentiful and sell from \$3 to \$3.25 per crate. Strawberries are over. The local butter market is still firm with prospects of a further increase in price. The wholesale price in Seattle is now 53 1/2c per pound. New Zealand butter, which appears on the B.C. market late in the fall, is also firm in price. The prospects are that butter will be high this winter. Upriver shipments of vegetables are commencing to appear on the local markets, and are of a very fine variety. Green peas from upriver are superior to anything which has appeared on the market from the south and have a very fine flavor.
