Reporting generally on the conduct of the hospital, Miss Harrison's report stated that the month of October had been a very busy one with as high as 61 patients in the hospital on two occasions and an unusually large proportion of very sick cases. It had been necessary to put extra beds in two wards and use the Hibrary as a private ward. Miss | Harrison acknowledged donations that had been made to the hospital during the month and also announced that the Workmen's Compensation Board during its recent visit here had been extended the use of hospital facilidies for its work.


