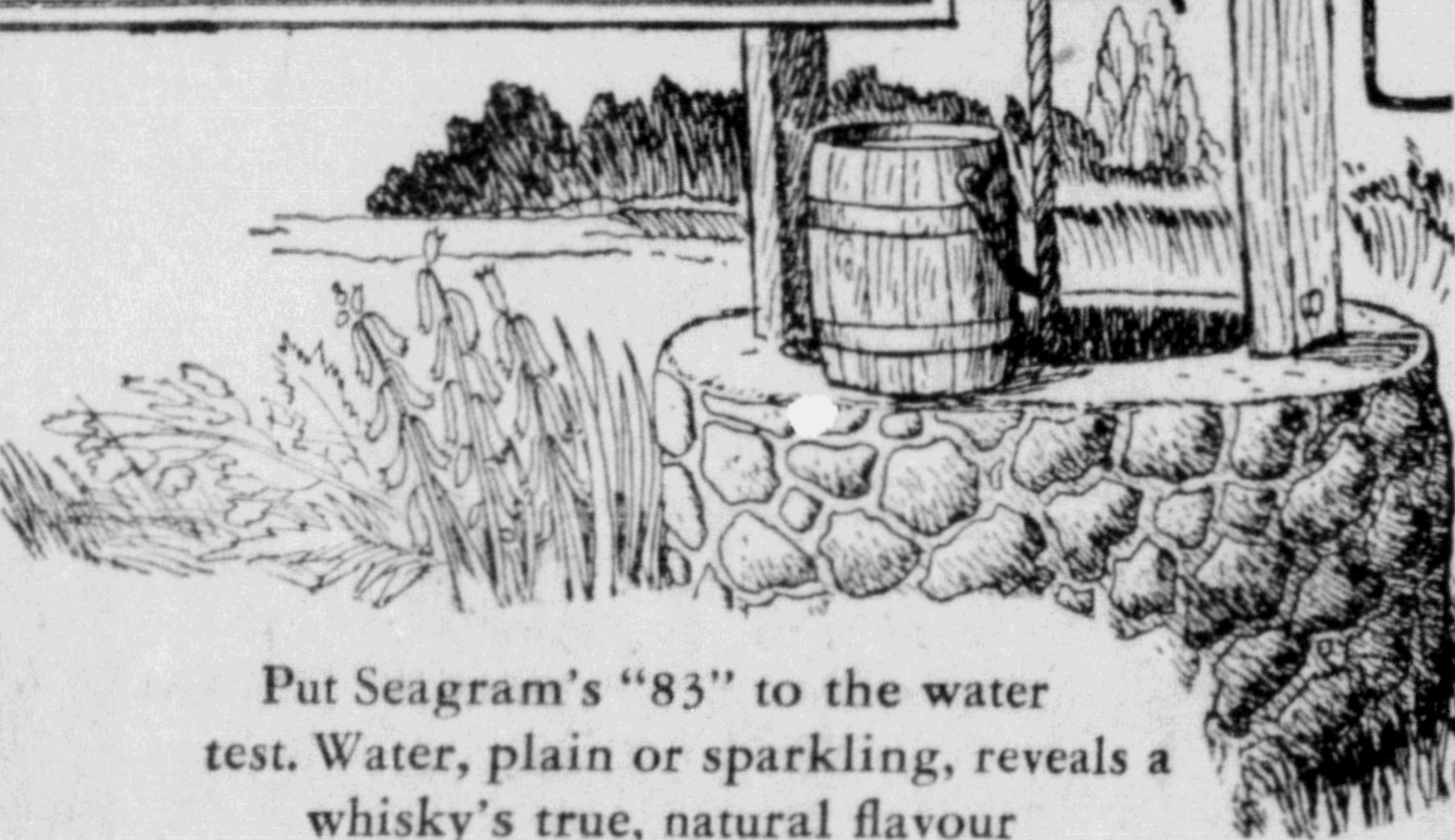

## Railroader Retires After Rising to Vice-President From Clerk's Post

MONTREAL—A man who made 1912 the foundation for a 40-year career in railroading leading to a vice-presidency of the Canadian National Railways was honored here Wednesday by fellow vice-presidents of the system.

At a dinner they saluted Harold Cooper whose contributions to rail and air transportation accounting methods have won him international recognition.

Mr. Cooper retires Sept. 30. One of his biggest achievements occurred in 1923 when he consolidated the accounts of the lines which now comprise the Canadian National system. The amalgamation involved more than 100 companies in four major groups, each with its own separate accounting method.

A uniform set of accounting procedures had to be devised for the new organization and there was no pattern or precedent to work from. The principles he laid down then have never been changed. He was appointed comptroller of the company in 1937 and a vice-president in 1945.

He has also been comptroller of Trans-Canada Air Lines since its inception in 1937 and he organized the TCA accounting system which has been authorized by the Air Transport Board as a standard for all Canadian air lines.

Many of its features have been adopted by the International Air Transport Association. In addition to the administrative duties attached to his vice-presidential office, Mr. Cooper has undertaken many special assignments. He had an important part in the preparation of the CNR's submission to the recent Royal Commission on transportation and has attended every session of the parliamentary committee on railways and shipping since 1923.

## Opportunities in Pharmacy Described by B.C. Officials

Growing opportunities for young men training in pharmacy were pictured by officials of the Pharmaceutical Association of B.C. during their visit to Prince Rupert yesterday.

They were E. A. Mann, president, and Fred Fullerton, manager, who with other interested authorities are making a tour of northern and central cities.

"Manufacturers, the armed services, hospitals, government agencies, educational establishments and numerous other organizations are all offering a greater number of openings for students going in for pharmacy," Mr. Mann said.

"Taking the armed services as an example, the army undertakes to put a student through his last two years of pharmaceutical study in college, at no expense to himself, and awards him a commission upon graduation. The navy and air force have similar schemes."

Mr. Fullerton said that drug manufacturers are in increasing need of "detail men," who are trained pharmacists assigned to explain to members of the medical profession the latest developments in the drug production.

Mr. Fullerton felt that formation of the college of pharmacy at the University of BC has done much to encourage young men to enter the profession.

The party left last night for Prince George. Also in the group were A. F. McDuffee, registrar, and Professor Finlay A. Morrison, assistant dean in the UBC college of pharmacy; and Vera Enves, editor of Western Druggist.

## Rain Delays Harvest But Apples Heavy

WINNIPEG—Intermittent rains have further delayed harvest operations in the prairie provinces and only in the past two or three days has it been possible to resume combining and threshing in many sections, particularly in Saskatchewan and Alberta.

An increase in tough grades is noted in marketings in several sections due to rains which have occurred since harvesting began and to the inferior drying weather as the season progresses, according to the Canadian National Railways agricultural department.

In some districts, upwards of two weeks of good weather is needed before harvesting can be completed in the west.

### OKANAGAN

Weather was warmer in the Okanagan Valley, with very cool nights. No rains and a few high winds.

Bartlett pears equalled previous estimates in yield and the movement of these is finished.

Flemish Beauties are being harvested at present but D'Anjou have not started. Prunes are still moving in volume and will continue to do so for another few days.

Peaches for the fresh market are now practically finished but movement to canners will continue for some little time.

McIntosh apples are moving in heavy volume and Delicious are now commencing to move. Rome Beauties and Jonathans have not been picked as yet.

Previous estimate of apples to fresh market was 6,488,000 boxes. This has now been revised upwards to 6,524,000 boxes.

"It's always hard for our people to get employment in the past and now. Their livelihood depends entirely on the fishing industry."

"The merchants of Prince Rupert, unfortunately, will feel the pinch. This loss of earnings will hit our people hard."

### PRAISES CANNERIES

Mr. Williams praised the cannery operators for their help, saying:

"From the beginning of the canning industry on the B.C. coast, the canning companies have been generous to the Native peoples in advancing money and assisting them with gear for their boats and money advanced to the needy during the winter."

"I personally state that the companies in the past have done more for the immediate welfare of the natives than the Department of Indian Affairs."

"I'm not criticizing the department because they are restricted so much that their field men cannot do as much as they would like at times."

"This smear campaign that is now going on is not hurting the officers or the members of the Native Brotherhood."
