FLOODS IN JAPAN CAUSE MUCH DAMAGE

Thirty Thousand Houses Sub-
 merged in Honj District of
 Tokio

TOKIO, Aug. 27.—One of the
 worst floods in ten years due to
 36 hours rain took place in the
 Honj district of the city and is
 now beginning to subside. It is
 estimated that 30,000 houses
 were submerged, residents spend-
 ing the night in the hills. The
 damage is estimated at several
 million yen.

APPLICATION FOR MILL SITE LEASE

Victoria to Have New Shingle
 Mill Employing 150 Men

VICTORIA, Aug. 27.—Formal
 application has been made to the
 Provincial Government for the
 lease of the property, terms have
 been agreed upon, and work will
 start early next month, it is an-
 ticipated, on the shingle mill to
 be erected on the Reserve, south
 of Point Ellice Bridge by H. B.
 Horton and John McMaster of
 Seattle. Satisfactory negotia-
 tions with the city on the taking
 over the abandoned site of the
 Foundation Company were com-
 pleted early in the week.

It was the original intention
 of the company to commence
 operating the mill early in Sep-
 tember and in view of the delay
 construction work will be rushed
 as speedily as possible so that
 the mill can commence turning
 out shingles to meet the orders
 on hand. The firm is well fi-
 nanced and under the direction
 of experienced shingle men. Mr.
 Horton is a son of the largest
 shingle shipper from the port of
 Seattle. Mr. McMaster is a son
 of John McMaster of the McMas-
 ter Shingle Mill Company, the
 father of the shingle industry in
 the Pacific Northwest, with mills
 at many points in the state of
 Washington.

About fifty men will be em-
 ployed as soon as the mill opens.
 Within a year it is anticipated
 that at least 150 men will be
 employed. Only white men will
 be given employment in the mill.

GOLD MEDALS FOR DOG TEAM DRIVERS

Ten Men to Get Recognition for
 Aiding in Carrying Anti-
 Toxin to Nome

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Gold
 medals will be awarded to ten
 drivers of dog teams which car-
 ried anti-toxin to Nome last
 March in an effort to combat
 the diphtheria epidemic which
 was then raging there. The
 presentation will be made at
 Juneau by Governor Parks.
