## PREVENT FUTURE WARFARE IS OBJECTIVE

### EXPERIMENT WITH WIRELESS COMMUNICATION FOR YUKON UNSATISFACTORY

#### Proposal to Germany with View to an Endless Era of Peace Made by France and the Other Allies

LONDON, Aug. 27.—France and her allies have invited Germany to enter into negotiations for a definite treaty intended to guarantee an endless era of peace in western Europe. The invitation was extended in a note handed the German government by the French ambassador at Berlin Monday and made public in the various capitals last night. It is in reply to Germany's note of July 20 on the subject covering three points: That the treaty of Versailles must not be modified. That Germany should enter the League of Nations, not with reservations as Germany suggested. That provision should be made for compulsory arbitration of future disputes between nations.

#### MORE CRIME IN LARGER CITIES

Must be Awakening of Parents, Preachers and Teachers to Prevent it  
WINNIPEG, Aug. 27.—The report of the committee on the administration of criminal justice presented to the Bar Association at its convention here, recognizes that crime in the large centres is increasing and special effort is needed to prevent it. #### RUM RUNNING BOATS TAKEN

Two Seized at Discovery Island and Others Escape When Government Launch Arrives  
VICTORIA, Aug. 27.—Three boats were arrested yesterday when the customs launch Winamac discovered the boats in a cove at Discovery Island. One of the craft seized had 150 cases of whiskey aboard. Two other vessels escaped. A fifth had a satisfactory explanation of their presence at the scene.

#### CHICAGO WOMAN KILLS HUSBAND

Three Deadly Shots is Reply of Mrs. Joseph Carroll to Her Mate's Dare  
CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—"You haven't the nerve to shoot," Joseph Carroll said to his wife when she pointed a pistol at him during a family row. Police-men found the woman, holding her 14 month old baby, sitting beside the body of her dead husband. She had fired three times.

#### CHINESE CREW OF VESSEL GO TO JAIL FOR GOING ON STRIKE

VANCOUVER, Aug. 27.—Sixteen Chinese members of the crew of the freighter City of Victoria, who last week went on strike in obedience, they said, to orders from Shanghai, were yesterday sentenced to serve six weeks in jail, after which they will be deported.

#### ALEX GALLAGHER IS SENT UP FOR TRIAL

Committed by Stewart Magistrate Will Await Return of County Court Judge for Election  
Alex Gallagher, committed for trial on Tuesday by Stipendiary Magistrate J. P. Searlett on a charge of having brought stolen goods, namely a gas boat, from United States to Canada, returned to the city on the Prince Charles last evening in custody of Provincial Constable Markland. Gallagher will come up for election in the County Court next week on the return of Judge Young from the interior.

#### Resumption of Service Over Land Line Looked for by Superintendent

That wireless as the regular means of communication for the Yukon will be discontinued in the near future and that service over the old Yukon telegraph line will be restored is the opinion of J. T. Phelan, superintendent of Yukon Telegraphs, who is a visitor in the city in the course of his annual inspection tour. Considerable dissatisfaction has been expressed, Mr. Phelan says, with the service that has been given this year by wireless as compared with the service formerly given when the land line was in operation. Rates are much higher and, in the summer months, atmospheric conditions prevent the people getting the service that they were used to when the land line was in operation. Last March the service was changed from telegraph to wireless. Now the latter has been given a fair try-out, Mr. Phelan thinks that the results warrant going back to the old system. The stations may well be retained for emergency use but for the steady, regular means of communication Mr. Phelan believes that telegraph will be the best. The land line north of Hazelton into the Yukon, he says, has been kept in shape and mended so that service on it can be resumed at any moment.

#### FRENCH DEBT SETTLEMENT

Agreement Gets General Support Although Some Objection is Voiced Against Moral-torium  
LONDON, Aug. 27.—Commenting on the provisional settlement of the French debt, Joseph Caillaux, finance minister, said: "Each of us must put a little water in our wine." The agreement receives the general support of the British although, in some quarters, criticism is made on the ground that Great Britain is getting "too much water." Objection is taken to the proposed moral-torium for France until 1930.

#### Prince Rupert is Destined to Become Thriving Grain Port; Difficulties to be Overcome

"I really believe that in years to come Prince Rupert will be a thriving grain port," writes a grain dealer from the prairies, who knows the business well and who is not biased in favor of this place in any way. He says that grain is like water, it will seek the point of least resistance. One great boost to the grain business here, the letter suggests, would be the building of the railway line from Peace River either by Spirit River or Grande Prairie to Prince George, thus shortening the rail haul to proposed cutoff by Brule would not affect this port so favorably, equalizing of the grain rates to both ports would place our facilities on a favorable footing. The letter says that so far as ships are concerned they go where the business is offering and if the business is offering here, there will be no difficulty in that respect. The fact that the steaming time on the round trip is four days in favor of this port over any other in the Oriental trade should make a difference in rates of about 25c a short ton. The handicap of the Canadian National in having to use Great Northern Railway tracks for entry into the city of Vancouver also gives Rupert the edge insofar as the railway is concerned. It is further suggested that canned salmon packed in this portion of the province would be shipped from this port direct if vessels were calling regularly. Turning to the adverse side, it is pointed out that being little farming, ranching and poultry raising in this district would make it difficult to dispose of grain which was off grade as there would be no chance of disposing of it. It would put the port at a disadvantage as only specified grades could be handled here. At Vancouver the off-grade wheat is disposed of all the time locally for the dairies and chicken ranches, thus reducing the amount of grain the exporter has to carry in store. Whether the time is ripe for the advent of an exporting house the writer is doubtful. So much, he thinks, depends upon the development of the Peace River country. The letter will be useful in that it points out difficulties which have to be overcome in shipping grain through the elevator here and also mentions the advantages.

#### MORE FLAMES IN MONTREAL

Property Loss of \$300,000 Was Caused by Fires Which Menaced City Last Night  
MONTREAL, Aug. 27.—Montreal was seriously menaced by fire again last night. Four fires were fought within a period of a few hours. A loss of \$300,000 was caused by the flames.

#### STREET CAR CUTS OFF BOTH LEGS OF 5-YEAR OLD GIRL

Did Not Cry or Lose Consciousness But Died in Hospital After Father Had Given Quart of Blood  
MONTREAL, Aug. 27.—With both legs amputated by the wheels of a street car, Helen Synette, aged five, was carried to the police station by the motor-man. The child did not cry or lose consciousness but died in the hospital after her father had given a quart of his blood in an attempt to save her life.

#### LOS ANGELES WIFE MURDERER SUICIDES

Dr. Thomas W. Young, Dentist, Strangles Himself in Jail  
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 27.—Dr. Thomas W. Young, dentist, charged with murdering his wife and disposing of the body in a cistern, today committed suicide in jail by strangling himself with a piece of wire.

#### MADE RECORD IN POURING CEMENT ELEVATOR BINS

Carter-Halls - Aldinger Co. Ltd. had the best day yet on Wednesday in the pouring of concrete for the elevator storage bins. The record was 9 feet one inch in the two shifts. This brings the height of the structure now to 81 feet six inches not including the basement. It is likely that, by the end of the week, the total height of 95 feet of bins proper will be reached. Then the top floor and cupolas will be put on.

#### TWO DROWNED FROM LAUNCH

Tale of Murder and Suicide is Being Investigated by Searchers  
PETERSBURGH, Alaska, Aug. 27.—Investigators of the tale that Thomas Rise killed his wife by pushing her overboard from a gasoline launch and committed suicide by jumping in after her are hunting for his body. Her's was found yesterday.

#### Flying Officer Hull and His Mechanic, Corporal Davenport, had Close Call in Plane Smash

Flying Officer A. H. Hull and Corporal H. E. Davenport were fortunate to escape with their lives at the end of last week when plane G.M. was wrecked in the rough waters of Milbank Sound when a connecting rod in their engine was broken and the motor flew to pieces. After the forced landing had been made, the officers of the machine, who were accompanied by Fisheries Overseer D. S. Cameron, floated around for three-quarters of an hour until the American steamer Yukon, Capt. Glascock, hove in sight. By this time the machine was just about on the rocks but Capt. Glascock nosed his vessel between the rocks and took the ship in tow. With everybody still on board, the flying boat was towed by the Yukon to the north end of Milbank Sound where it was picked up by the Malaspina. Mr. Cameron then went aboard the patrol ship while Flying Officer Hull and Corporal Davenport remained with the plane. On the way to China Hat, the plane capsized nose first and Flying Officer Hull and Corporal Davenport were both thrown into the sea. They clambered out, however, and were taken aboard the steamer. The wrecked plane is now at China Hat and is being taken down preparatory to being shipped on the lighthouse tender Estevan either here or to Vancouver. In any case, this will be the last of plane GM as far as her activities this year are concerned. The hull and wings of the plane, despite the experience, are reported to be in good shape. This is the second plane that has been put out of business in fisheries patrol in this district this season. Plane DU, piloted by Flying Officer Morfee, in making a forced landing in Queen Charlotte Sound a few weeks ago, had the hull so badly smashed that it was burned at Hardy Bay. The wings were, however, intact and were sent to Vancouver while the engine is now in plane GN which is being flown here by Squadron Leader Tudhope.

#### Dunwell Capital to be Doubled in Order to Place Bear River Mine on a Producing Basis

VICTORIA, Aug. 27.—Operation of the Dunwell Mine on Bear River near Stewart is to be carried on by the present company and in order to do this the capital of the mine is to be increased from \$350,000 to \$700,000, it was decided at a general meeting of shareholders of the company held here yesterday. The expenditure of this money will put the property in such a position as to be second only to the Premier in importance in the Portland canal camp. The mine will then be on a producing basis. Shareholders of the company are given the first option of taking the new issue at par and subscriptions amounting to \$140,000 have already been received. As the present shares of the company are held at around \$1.60 to \$2.00 a share, the allotting of the shares to present holders is in the nature of a bonus to them.

#### URGES JUSTICE RICH AND POOR

Lord Buckmaster Suggests to Barristers that they Take Poor Men's Cases  
WINNIPEG, Aug. 27.—Declaring that justice should be swift, certain and open alike to rich and poor, Lord Buckmaster of Cheddington, former Lord Chancellor of England, told the annual convention of the Canadian Bar Association last night that in his opinion the legal profession deserved reproach, in that while the poor man was sure of even justice from the bench he was not sure to get it from the bar. He advanced the idea to remedy this reproach when he suggested that every lawyer take a certain number of poor men's cases every year.

#### NEW YORK TONG WAR IS ENDED

Five Orientals Killed, Several Wounded and Large Number are Under Arrest  
NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—After a toll of five dead had been taken, several had been wounded and many arrested, Chinese Tong leaders today promised the police to stop the latest war. Hostilities ceased in New York this morning.
