# NOT MUCH GOLD IS TAKEN OUT FROM GOLD PAN

Dave Mawhinney Says it Will Just About Pay for the Grub This Year

## WENT IN BY DOG TEAM

Found Body of Prospector in Delapidated Cabin Where he Died Last Winter

"The country is full of gold but the work at Gold Pan and surrounding creeks has not been up to expectations and the operators there will not get much more than enough to pay for their grub this year, according to D. C. Mawhinney of Copper City, who is in the city today on his way home.

Mr. Mawhinney says there are forty men working on Gold Pan Creek, a dozen of whom are operating the claims where the first discovery was made by Dan Grady. At the time he left only \$200 worth of gold had reached Telegraph Creek Gold Commissioner's office from the diggings but it was known that 160 ounces had been taken out by Grady and associates. This was not a bad showing for the first year. At the same time it would only just about pay for the grub, for everything there is very expensive, the cost of transportation being so high.

## Died of Sickness

Mr. Mawhinney was the man who discovered the body of Kinder, the prospector, who had gone to look for the lost mine. Leaving Hazelton by dog team last March he passed from the head of the Skeena River to the south head of the Stikine. He found Kinder in an old delapidated cabin with plenty of food supplies around him. Apparently he had been taken ill and was unable to help himself. There were no windows in the cabin and no firewood cut. Long logs of wood had been put into the stove, leaving one end out, showing that he had been unable to chop wood and had prepared no store in

advance. The place was miserable and uncared for. Mawhinney was there on April 20. The body of the prospector was frozen and he considered it likely he had died about February. He left the body in the cabin and it was later buried by Cline Dexter who had taken forty head of horses into the country.

## Plane Coming Soon

Asked as to the big plane which had gone in there early this season from Prince Rupert, Mr. Mawhinney said it had made several trips into the Liard country but so far as he knew had not obtained any results worth mentioning. They were expecting to leave soon and would fly to Prince Rupert. Operation of the plane is costly as gasoline there costs a dollar a gallon.

Mr. Mawhinney says there are seven tractors plying from Telegraph Creek to Dease Lake, a distance of 72 miles, taking in supplies and machinery and doing general freighting. There is a possibility that Mr. Mawhinney may go in again next year, he says.

# EARL McLEOD AT SKIDEGATE

Reached There at One O'clock Today in Hour and Three Quarters

Leaving Digby Island base at 11:15 this morning, flying boat EA, piloted by Flight Lieutenant Earl McLeod, covered the 140 mile distance to Skidegate, Queen Charlotte Islands, in one hour and three-quarters reaching there at 1 o'clock this afternoon. This is considered very good time by Squadron Leader Tudhope who, in plane GN, accompanied Lieut. MacLeod about 20 miles out. While there were low clouds hanging here, it was clear outside and visibility was excellent.

On board Lieut. MacLeod's plane was Major E. J. Ashton, commissioner of the Soldiers' Settlement Board from Ottawa, who is to look over land on Graham Island particularly around Massett Inlet and on the East coast. He will be taken on flights tomorrow and the day after and then Lieut. MacLeod will be engaged in patrol work until the plane is brought back here next Wednesday or Thursday. Lieut. K. G. McCullagh of the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals also made the flight to the Islands. A mechanic is already there, having gone across by goal.

# ELWOOD BARD IS IN TROUBLE AGAIN

Faces Charge of Robbery With Violence From Hindu in Downtown Hotel Last Night

Elwood Bard is again in the hands of the police facing a serious charge. Last night at 12.55 a complaint was sent in to the police station that Bard had been in trouble in the New Empress Hotel. It was alleged that he had gone to Room B, occupied by a Hindu named Hucken Singh, and had there drawn a gun and robbed the Hindu of a sum of money. Constable Crate responded to the call and arrested Bard a few minutes later in a Japanese restaurant where he was having a row with a waiter. Bard, who showed signs of having had liquor, gave fight to the officer but was taken to the jail without difficulty. This morning he was charged in court with robbery with violence and was remanded for eight days. He is now in hospital suffering from a sprained ankle believed to have been sustained in the course of last night's trouble.

# In the Letter Box

## INVESTORS WARNED

The Editor, Daily News.  
May I take the liberty through your columns to voice a word of warning against the operations of stock salesmen who are endeavoring to convince the public of the fortunes to be made by investing their money in enterprises which are more or less unknown in the financial world? The arguments chiefly used by these salesmen consist of a glowing account of the prospects before their respective companies, accompanied by verbal examples of the fortunes which have been made by others who were supposedly lucky enough to get in on the ground floor.

It should be remembered by those who seek safe investment with reasonable dividend yields that the production of articles of merchandise and the production of dividends are by no means synonymous terms and one of the first rules which a prospective investor would do well to observe would be to investigate carefully the past record of those promoting these enterprises, the history of their dividend payments and above all to analyze their present financial position; and what security an investor would have for placing his money in the hands of those to whom he must submit control over operations. Considerable sums of local money have of late been invested in wildcat schemes through the enterprise of high powered stock salesmen and I feel sure that if such investors had insisted upon the light of day being allowed to filter through the financial affairs of some of these concerns they would not in future years have to count as a sad experience their venture into a speculative fortune.
