

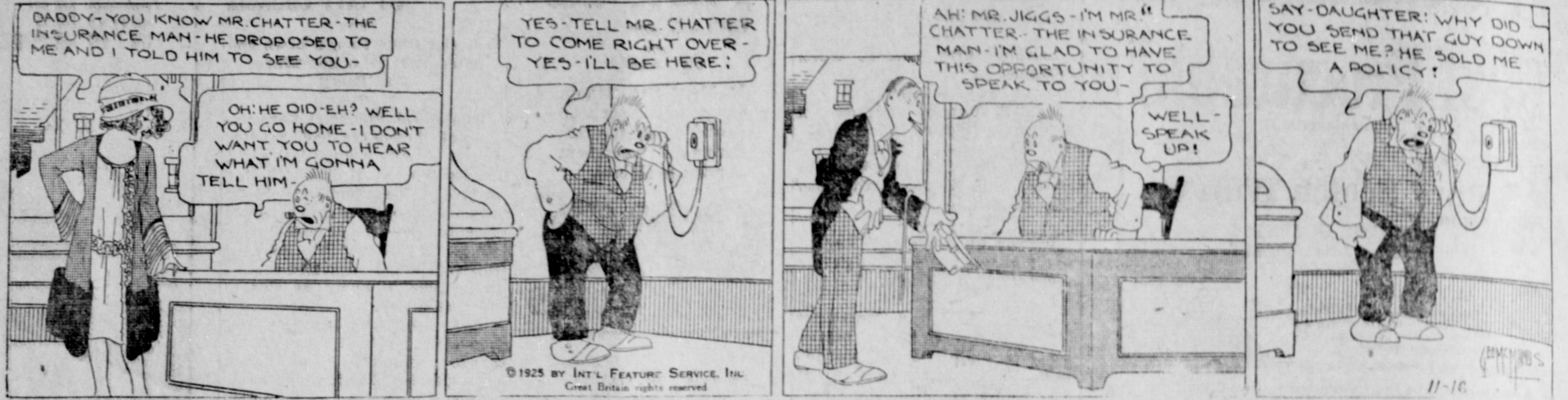

GRAIN BOARD KEEPING BUSY

Resolution of Confidence in Chairman Passed at Meeting last Night

A meeting of the Grain Board was held in the City Hall last night, M.P. McCaffery, chairman of the board, occupying the chair. In reporting upon his recent personal business trip in the south, when he undertook to make inquiries among Canadian National Railway officials, officials of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, and grain brokers in the interests of the board, the chairman stated he had interviewed W. A. Kingsland, general manager of the western region C.N.R. and B. C. Keeley, Pacific coast superintendent C.G.M.M., and men interested in the grain trade generally and was optimistic as to the final outcome of the shipment of grain through the local elevator.

In explaining the opposition prevalent both in Edmonton and Vancouver against the shipping of grain through Prince Rupert, the chairman said that he had undertaken negotiations of a confidential nature for the operation of the local elevator, which negotiations would take about a week to mature, and he asked that the members of the local board pass a resolution of confidence in him and he would be prepared to report fully to them when the time had elapsed.

Upon assuring the members present that all phases of the grain business in the interests of the city had been taken care of, Olof Hanson moved that the confidence of the board be reposed in their chairman and that the meeting be adjourned for a week when a final report be brought in. This was seconded by Ald. Geo. Casey and carried.

Present at the meeting were S. D. Macdonald, vice-chairman, Mayor Newton, Olof Hanson, Ald. George Casey and S. Webb, secretary.

COUNCIL APPRECIATES SERVICES OF MR. LOVE

Resolution to This Effect Unanimously Passed by City Fathers Last Night

On motion of Ald. Perry, seconded by Ald. Larsen, the city council last night unanimously passed a resolution expressing regret at the resignation of Ernest Love as superintendent of utilities and appreciation of the efficient service he had given the city during his three years as superintendent. The resolution also carried instructions to the city clerk to furnish Mr. Love with a suitable recommendation.
