The Canadian Ford Company sells its touring car, exactly the same as the American Ford in construction, for \$445 .-00 at Ford, Ontario, where it is manufactured. The difference in price, then, is \$155.00, which the Canadian purchaser has to pay on this side of the line over what the same car sells for in the United States.
