

WOMAN SENTENCED TO YEAR IN PRISON

Killed Child When Driving Car Under Influence of Drink

LONDON, Nov. 26.— Found guilty of homicide in the High Court of Justice at Jeddburgh, a woman motorist, Mrs. Jean Collin or Brown, aged 39, the wife of a retired farmer, living at Eyemouth, Berwickshire, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment and a fine of £200, or in default a further term of three months' imprisonment.

She was accused of driving a motor car while under the influence of drink, and coming into collision with a cyclist and fatally injuring him. Other charges were that she came into collision with a perambulator, with the result that a child was thrown out and killed, and that the car knocked down and injured two boys. In her evidence the defendant said the accident would not have happened but for her husband having suddenly pulled the steering wheel out of her hand, which caused the car to swerve.

The jury returned a unanimous verdict of guilty on the homicide charge and two of the subsidiary charges, and found a fourth subsidiary charge not proven. The trial lasted three days.

In passing sentence, Lord Constable said he would not aggravate the painful position in which the accused stood by discussing the serious nature of the offences except to say that much as he should have wished it, he did not think he would be warranted in making any distinction between the case where a man was convicted of such offences and that of a woman.

STATES ADOPT HOCKEY GAME

New York and Pittsburg as Well as Boston Have Teams this Year in the East

TORONTO, Nov. 26.—(By Canadian Press)—"The fastest game in the world," professional hockey, is expected to increase its popularity with American fans during the coming winter, as New York and Pittsburg, in addition to Boston, have seriously adopted Canada's National winter sport.

Boston, with their middle class team of last year, drew very fair crowds, while Pittsburg's success in the amateur ranks speaks well for the success of their "Pro" club. Hockey however, is a new venture in New York City itself, games in the metropolis are to be played in Madison Square Garden, under the management of Tex Rickard.

Canadians form the major portion of all American teams entered in the league. Boston has Carson Cooper, Charlie Stewart, Schnarr and Odie Gleghorn as the Canadian representation. Pittsburg has Lionel Conacher, crack Canadian all-round athlete, who will captain the squad, and Sprague Cleghorn, formerly of the Canadians. The more notable performers on the Smoky City squad outside of the two mentioned are Worters, Drury, Colton and McCurry, who are all graduates from the Toronto amateur ranks.

New York has practically the entire Hamilton, Ont., team, which had the championship almost in their grasp last year when a dispute between the players and owners forced their withdrawal. Probable starters for the Gotham team include Forbes, Red and Shorty Green, Randall, Burch and Langlois, all Canadians.

Montreal's two teams, the former world's champion Canadians and the lesser known Maroons, are well supplied with players. Canadians have Vezina, Mantha, Goutu, Morenz, Joliet and Boucher on their roster, practically their complete team of last year, and in addition are well supplied with substitutes.

Maroons have a considerably younger team than their fellow-citizens. Their line-up includes: Benedict, Munro, Noble, Broadbent, Stewart, Siebert, Dinsmore, and Rothchild.

The Ottawa Senators are expected to field Connell, Ironsides, Boucher, Clancy, Denny, Smith and Nighbor. They seem to have a nicely balanced, fast team.

St. Patricks of Toronto will have Roach, McCaffery, Corbeau, Adams, "Babe" Dye, "Happy" Day, Bellefeuille, Reid, Gallagher and Holway. Cooper, Schnarr, Conacher, Worters, Drury, McCurry, Munro, McCaffery and Day are all comparative newcomers to professional ranks, having taken the step during the last two years.

The first game of the season will be played at Boston when the Pittsburg Hornets meet the Boston Bruins on November 26. Canadians will have a chance to see the new American teams in action on November 28 with Pittsburg at Canadiens and on December 2, when New York will meet St. Pats in Toronto.

WATER MAIN REPAIRS FINISHED TOMORROW

Local Users Will Have Clear Stream From Woodworth Lake in Pipes Again on Friday

Superintendent Ernest Love announced this morning that repairs to the big main will be completed tomorrow morning. The pipe is all together again and the joints are being leaded today. It was found necessary to replace altogether one of the lengths which was shattered as a result of the impact of the washout.

OUNCE OF ELECTRICITY IS THE LATEST THING

(Manchester Guardian) Something very surprising was said today by Professor John Ambrose Fleming, the leading exponent of wireless telegraphy and the chief authority in this country on thermionic valves, when he explained that it was now possible to talk of electricity in terms of ounces just as it was possible to talk of an ounce of tea or sugar: "It was, in fact, possible accurately and easily to calculate the weight of an electron, and so to arrive at a figure which would express the consumption in terms of weight of an ordinary electric lamp such as that used in the household at any given time."

From the figures which he gave a simple calculation showed that in one year a lamp of this size in general use would have consumed an ounce of electricity.
