TEES REPLACES SALVAGE SHIP

Purchased by Same Company
That Keeps Vessel at This
Port

VICTORIA, Sep. 16.—Replacing the steamer Salvage Chief, formerly known as the Nitinal, which was wrecked on Merry Island last spring, the C.P.R. steamer Tees, which has been continually under charter to the Pacific Salvage Co. for the past year, has been purchased by the company from the C.P.R.

The Tees will be renamed the Salvage Chief, and will enable the Pacific Salvage Co. still to have a vessel in port while the Salvage King is out on rescue or salvaging work. It was the Tees that salvaged the Tatjana, when she went ashore at Village Island, Barkley Sound, a year ago last winter.

Alterations have already been made to the Tees to fit her out as an up-to-date salvage ship, and all modern equipment for salvaging of vessels is being installed. The Tees is a steamer of 678 tons, 165 feet in length, 26 feet in beam and 10 feet depth.

With the purchase of the Tees from the C.P.R., the Pacific Salvage Co. is in a position to consider the stationing of a vessel at Banfield for use in life-saving patrol and salvage work. At the same time the company would have a vessel stationed at Victoria to attend to more local mishaps. The Vancouver Dredging and Barge Co., which is affiliated with the Pacific Salvage Co., looks after the mainland

MISSIONARIES FACE TROUBLous TIMES

Two Representing United Church
Leave for China

WATER NOTICE.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 16.—Dr. T. H. Williams of Winnipeg, member of the United Church of Canada Mission to West China, sailed from Vancouver for Shanghai recently, returning to the field by special request of workers now in the field. When sailings of the main parties of outgoing missionaries for the Szechuan province were postponed some weeks ago, the mission leaders at Chengtu urged that two of the forty-eight, Rev. W. J. Martimore, B.A., and Dr. Williams, be permitted to sail regardless of conditions in China. Mr. Martimore, who is secretary-treasurer of the Mission, sailed on August 20, leaving his wife and children in Toronto.

Dr. Williams also goes alone, his wife having died during the year. They returned on furlough in the spring of 1924, after a term of seven years at Chungchow, on the Yangtze river below Chungking. This time Dr. Williams is wanted at Luchow, above Chungking, in order to organize medical and surgical services at a hospital which was almost completed by Rev. W. R. Morrison, of Saskatchewan, missionary builder, who is now returning home through illness. Luchow is nearly 2,000 miles by river boat from Shanghai.

Dr. Williams is a graduate of the University of Manitoba, having put himself through medical school by working on the railway mail service on trains running out of Winnipeg. He was born in Oxford County, Ontario. He is supported by the Sunday school of Young Memorial Church, Winnipeg. Mrs. Williams was Laura H. W. McGinn of Winnipeg.

BERLIN, Sept. 15.—The fall of the house of Stinnes is complete. Less will be saved from the ruins than was heretofore imagined. The enemies of Stinnes are exultant and point to the wages of megalomania.

Friday's "Achtuhrt Abendblatt" published an apparently reliable report that Edmund Stinnes, the eldest son of the late Hugo Stinnes, had appealed to the Prussian government for the small sum of three million marks, since he was unable to pay even the 100,000 marks (£25,000) due in wages today in the Aga Motor Works, Berlin, alone.

It is known that after the first crash the Stinnes possessions were divided, Edmund taking the motor works and assurance companies. The banking consortium formed to assist the concern decided after inquiry that Edmund had received more than his share, but obtained his promise to support the consortium financially if the debts were greater than was supposed. But Stinnes declared that he was not obliged to go further. Thereupon the banks shut off all credits, and Stinnes appealed to the government for aid.

Offers Shares

When Saturday arrived, he found himself unable to pay wages. He therefore presented to the Shop Council two million marks' worth of shares, thus giving up his majority in the company.

The workers in the Aga motor works have not yet made up their minds whether to accept the offer. But Dr. Edmund Stinnes has succeeded in his aim, which was to draw the attention of public opinion to what he calls the attempt of the banks to enslave German industry. "They may take away one or two of my undertakings, but they shan't get me," was his comment before explaining how in his opinion the so-called Assistance Consortium had liquidated the old Hugo Stinnes firm in a way which practically reduced the family to poverty.

The fact is that whether the Bank Consortium wished or not for the family quarrel, or for the second quarrel between Dr. Edmund Stinnes and Herr Jakob Goldschmidt, president of the Darmstädter and National Bank, the name of Stinnes has been thrown down from its pedestal; the entire Stinnes possessions lost, the financial reputation of Germany lowered, and her credit abroad temporarily shattered. "I myself would really be satisfied if I could retire and see the world," said Dr. Edmund Stinnes. "It seems a pity to abandon all my father's undertakings, but rather than lie down to Jakob Goldschmidt I will willingly face bankruptcy."

Most of the newspapers consider Stinnes' offer of stock to workmen another proof of his incapacity to direct a big industrial undertaking, but personally young Stinnes makes an excellent impression. Some of his advanced ideas, now considered fantastic, may be a reality of the future.

PATROLMAN CHARGED SHOOTING AND KILLING

KETCHIKAN, Sept. 16.—Charged with having shot and killed Romie Atkinson, a well known athlete, city patrolman S. B. Van Zandt has been bound over to the grand jury by U.S. Commissioner Kehoe. It is claimed in defence that Atkinson resisted arrest but no defence evidence was given at the preliminary hearing, that being reserved for the actual trial.

IRISH INTEREST IN HORSES

DUBLIN, Sept. 16.—Entries for the annual horse show of the Royal Dublin Society created a high record this year with 916. Despite the growth in popularity of the automobile, there has been a considerable increase in interest in harness horses. For the bloodstock sales more than 800 horses were entered.

KETCHIKAN SCHOOLS LESS HALF AS MANY AS IN PRINCE RUPERT

KETCHIKAN, Sept. 16.—In the public school here at the opening of the term 362 pupils registered and there are 90 students in the high school.

The kindergarten has been suspended for the present owing to lack of accommodation in the building.

PUGET SOUND PACK OF SALMON LARGER

SEATTLE, Sept. 16.—A. E. Sims of Port Townsend, Washington state representative and member of the state fisheries board, declared today that the Puget Sound salmon pack this year is the largest since 1913. In 1913, 1,700,000 cases of spring sockeye, humpbacks and fall fish were packed. Sims estimated that 475,000 cases of humpbacks alone, valued at \$2,000,000, will be canned by the end of the season.
