MESSAGE FROM LOST HAYSPORT

Bottle Picked up Down the Coast Relates to Fate of Missing Auxiliary Schooner

Jarvis McLeod, collector of customs, has been advised that a bottle message was recently picked up in Kilkane Inlet in Pierce Canal by David Cordila of Gardner Canal purporting to have emanated from the schooner Haysport No. 2, which was supposed to have been lost with all hands on board in Millbank Sound last January while on her way from Vancouver to Skagway with a cargo of explosives for the Yukon. The message, which states that the Haysport was wrecked with no escape from drowning of the crew, has been taken to Vancouver by Mr. McArthur, manager of Butedale Cannery, to whom it was given by Cordila.

FEWER FATALITIES IN MINES OF B.C.

Only Five in First Nine Months of this Year, a Record for This Province

VICTORIA, Oct. 27.—According to official figures issued by Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, the present year to date has shown the smallest number of fatalities in the coal and metalliferous mines in the province in the last quarter of a century. For the first nine months of the present year there were five fatalities compared with eight in the same period in 1924 in coal mines, while in the metalliferous mines the total fatalities for the nine months this year were three compared with six in the same period last year.

The above is a most favorable showing and is due in very great measure to the care with which the mining regulations of the province are being enforced, the improved conditions under which the miners are working conse-
