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Prince Rupert Shut Out Anyox in Second Baseball Game; New Pitcher Was Star for Locals

Fanning seventeen men while he allowed only three hits during the entire nine innings, W. Stickney, Prince Rupert's new southpaw hurler, assisted by good work on the part of his field when such was necessary, shut out the visiting Anyox baseball team yesterday by a score of six to nothing. This evens up the series with Anyox and there will be a great deal of interest in the third and last game that is to take place tomorrow afternoon.

As far as the Prince Rupert team was concerned, it played its best game of the Fair Week series but the Anyox players were not up to the form shown in the opening game on Thursday. Ross' pitching was not effective, nor was the fielding as good as the day preceding, though the visitors did save a lot of hot ones in the infield and in the fifth pulled off a snappy double play.

Having nine hits off Ross while the visitors could only touch Stickney for three, the locals were fully deserving of their victory, though, had it not been for the fact that Anyox was unable to get runs on one or two occasions when men were in a threatening position on bases, the score might not have been a shut-out. In the fourth and sixth innings, Stickney pitched himself, by the strike-out method, out of what bore the appearance of becoming tight corners.

Anyox made eight errors and Prince Rupert three. The bright sunshine made it difficult for a while at third base and short, and this was responsible for some of the errors.

There was no scoring in the first five innings. Prince Rupert started in the sixth, when two runs and two hits were made; also two errors by Anyox. In the seventh Vic Menzies made a two-bagger, but there was no follow-up and he was put out at the home plate on a fielding choice. A series of errors resulted in another run for Prince Rupert in the eighth, and, with Ross weakening in the ninth, the locals got two two-baggers, a safe hit and three more runs.
