**CLIMACTIC BALL GAME**

**Ambitions of Gyros Shattered at Hands of Antlered Herd by 16 to 14**

In spite of a climactic last inning in which they scored nine runs, the Gyro Club's would-be baseball players lost to the agile Elks by a score of 16 to 14 in the alleged ball game at Acropolis Hill grounds yesterday. There were times during the game that runs crossed the plate so often that it was very difficult to keep track of them but the scorekeeper said the final score was 16 to 14 and he ought to have known.

The Gyro Club fielded bona fide members in the game and so did the Elks, but the latter had more ball players to choose from. At least, that is the Gyro Club's alibi. Moreover, the latter say if they had had a chance after the fifth innings they would have been so warmed up that the Elks would have been relegated to the tall timber, there to tangle their antlers in the ignominy of the thing. However, that is what might have happened but it didn't.

"Doc" Kenny, hurler for the Elks, pitched three good innings, commenced to weaken in the fourth and entirely outlived his usefulness in the fourth when aforesaid nine runs were scored by the Gyros who, however, started just a little too late. Roy McNaughton pitched three innings for the Gyros and was pulled in favor of Stan Taylor who, apparently, had not been warmed up enough.

Jarvis McLeod, short stop for the Elks, was one of the features of the game. He gave a wonderful exhibition of base stealing in the first inning and crawled through S. K. Campbell or something like that, landing safe on third base on his chest. It didn't hurt Jarvis any but the rebound almost knocked out Charlie Biggart, the third baseman, who, a few minutes later, forgot all about the game while he was searching through the muskeg for a foul ball that he should have caught before it got that far.

No count was kept of the errors in the game nor of the hits which weren't as many as the runs, in themselves hard enough to keep tabs on.

The conclusion to be drawn from the game is that the Gyros should keep their offensive in the future for the Rotarians or some other aggregation in their own class. Of course, Manager Eddie Mann was not present to pit his wits against those of "Babe" Fortin who seemed to be in command of the Elks' nine. Had Eddie been there instead of George Tite, jr., the result would have been different even if it became necessary to "gyp" the score sheet.
