HONOLULU, Sept. 11. - The crew of the missing naval scaplane was found tast night fifteen miles east of Kauai by a United States submarine which was searching for it.

The plane was picked up approximately 450 miles west of the point where they were forced to alight. The five men who were aboard drifted 218 hours. Their food had been exhausted four days but they managed to secure sufficient water to assauge their thirst by draping canvas from the wings of the plane and using it to catch the rain drops.


