LIBRARIAN IS LEAVING CITY

Miss Violet Mortimer Resigns and Steps Taken by Board to Fill the Position

At the meeting of the library board held last evening the resignation of Miss Violet Mortimer as librarian was accepted with regret. Miss Mortimer said she was leaving the city and wished to resign on October 1. It is understood that she is to be married and will reside in California.

H. F. Pullen, chairman of the board, spoke of the unflinching courtesy Miss Mortimer had shown in her work and of her general efficiency. They would all be sorry to see her leave.

Rev. G. G. Hacker said Miss Mortimer had been more than courteous. She had gone out of her way to help patrons of the library and no trouble was too great for her to take. Personally he was very sorry the librarian was leaving.

C. V. Wilkinson, secretary, said when he first heard that Miss Mortimer would be leaving he communicated with some of the librarians in the south with a view to getting a person trained to the work to take Miss Mortimer's place. The result had so far not been very satisfactory. The replies indicated that the larger salaries paid in the United States had drawn away most of the younger librarians and none were available. However, it was thought that someone might be found. It was decided to advertise in the two local papers and also in one of the Vancouver papers and also to write several centres including Edmonton, Regina and possibly Queen's University. Members of the board expressed themselves as determined if possible to secure a person who was trained for the position in order that the good work so well started here might go on.
