P. Z. Caverhill, chief forester for the province, who is here in the course of his annual tour of inspection, will leave on tomorrow morning's train for Victoria enroute to his headquarters in Victoria.

Application was made to the city council last night by W. S. Fisher on behalf of Mrs. Ada G. McRae for permission to purchase lot 63, block 34, section 1, for \$160.75. An undivided half interest was held by Mrs. McRae in this lot which was sold at the 1924 tax sale.

The oil heating system in the City Hall during the month of September cost \$1.44 per day for fuel according to the report of John Walker Exley, janitor, submitted to the council last night. The total fuel consumption for the month was 546 gallons or 18 gallons per day at 80 per gallon.

The case of Malcolm R. McLeod, local contractor, vs. the City of Prince Rupert in which claim is made for balance under plank road repair contract will be dealt with at the session of the Supreme Court Assizes to be held in December. An appearance has been entered by the city in response to plaintiff's writ.

Provincial Police Constable Martin of the district office of Prince Rupert has been transferred to the Prince George detachment, his post here to be filled later and will proceed to the interior on Thursday. Sergeant A. McNeil, who is to become chief constable here, arrived on last night's train from Prince George.

John Haldane, Indian, was fined \$20 and costs in the city police court this morning for intoxication; Robert Sankey was fined \$10 for a similar offence as was also Joe Ryan. The first two declared that they received their liquor from a white man at the railway station while Ryan said he got his from another Indian.

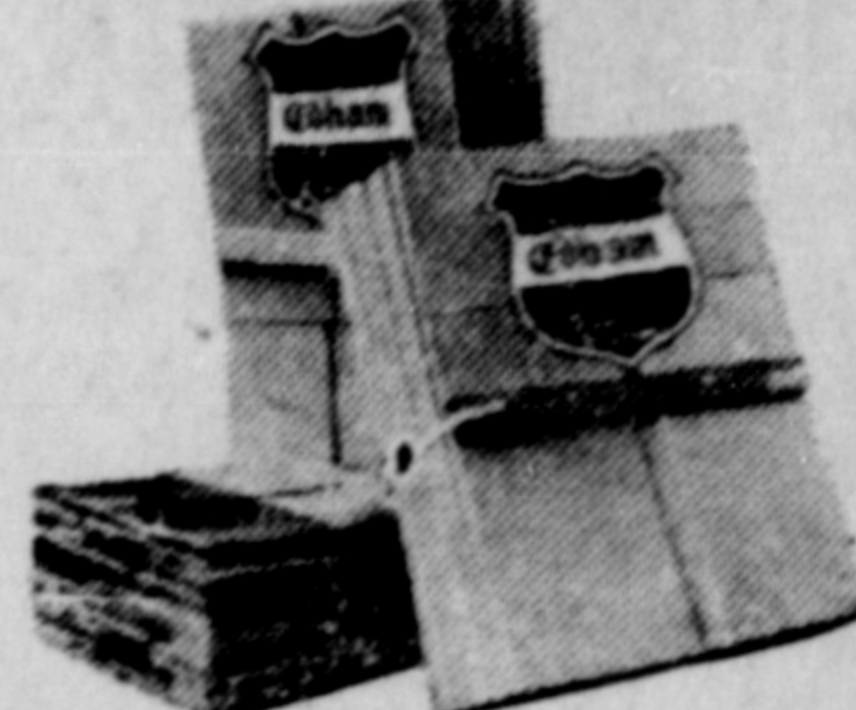
